## NOT THE RIGHT MAN.

In our last issue we announced that we could not support E. M. Brattain for district attorney.

This paper as before stated is strictly a republican organ. We were accused by a certain republican of having sold out to a democrat. Our friend is mistaken. This paper opposes Brattain not for hire, for we were asked to name our price to support him, but we declined by telling his friend that we would not support him for any price.

Our reasons for opposing a candidate upon the republican ticket are numerous and weighty—such when well understood we believe will cause all substantial and fair-minded republicans, who have the welfare of our party at heart, to refuse to support Mr. Brattain.

He not only failed to announce his candidacy before the primaries but he and his political allies steadfastly averred that he was not a candidate for any office. He could not have carried more than one or two precincts in the county if he had announced his candidacy before the primaries and it is conceded by some of his partisans that he could not have been nominated on a straight-out contest.

The reasons why are many. He was county judge of Lake county from 1894 to 1898 and for many months at a time he was out of the county and the state following the race circuit with a race horse in Montana, Texas, California, Maryland, and elsewhere the county being without a judge all these months and on account of this sporting tour failed to attend the board of equalization.

At the termination of his career as county judge no one even suspected that he would hold official position again, but he braced up for awhile and his old time friends sought to help him to his feet once more and succeeded in getting him appointed as register of the U. S. land office at Lakeview, which position he held for about five years, and until President Roosevelt notified the Oregon congressional delegation that if it did not promptly recommend someone to succeed him, the President himself would take the matter in his hands and appoint his successor. The specific reasons why the president so promptly requested the delegation to name his successor, we do not assume to be able to detail, but it is generally understood that they were of a most grave and serious nature and are still under investigation by the interior department. Suffice it to say that his administration as register was characterized by the grossest neglect, inattention and carelessness, which has worked injury and inconvenience to the patrons of the office. In fact it will be many months yet before all these muddles are disentangled.

To now foist this man upon the people of this district and place him in such an important official position would be a direct insult to our president, who has been vigorous in weeding out from public service such men.

If Brattain is worthy of an election then President Roosevelt has been in the wrong. Why should we, in effect, say to the president that he has taken the wrong course in these matters? Would it not be a slap in the face of the president to elect this man?

Again we say that this a republican paper, but we know of no better service we can give the republican party than by opposing E. M. Brattain's election. It is safe to say that fifty per cent of the republicans in Lake county will vote for his opponent.

Our brother at Silver Lake says he is an able lawyer. How does he know this? It is an actual fact that Brattain has never tried a case in the circuit court of this or any other county. Do the taxpayers of the district want a man with his lack of qualifications in this important office?

Think for a moment what useless expense would be incurred in cases where witnesses are frequently called from the distant parts of these large counties. Suppose the indictment is defective, or the state fails to properly present the case. The criminal goes unpunished and the county foots the bill.

His opponent, W. J. Moore, is an upright gentleman, and has been actually engaged in the practice of his profession at this place for the past eight years. He was deputy under A. E. Reames for about three years. Mr. Moore is an industrious student in his profession and has acquired the finest law library in this district. He is a conservative and safe counselor, and if elected, the people's interests will be protected.

Whatever merits the Primary law may have to recommend it to the voter, or whatever complications discredit the law, there is one phase of the proposed new primary law that appeals strongly to the common voter. It does away with bossism. It gives the people a say in who will be their nominees, and no chance for political jobbery. This is a feature of the law that commends itself favorably to the voter, and is worthy of his consideration.

## Plead Guilty in Federal Court

When the cases of Charles Cunningham, Asa Reyburn, Dallas O'Harra, G. H. Sailing, Shelly Jones and Mark Shaleford were brought up for hearing in the Federal court in Portland on May 5th, all but Shaleford plead guilty. These men were indicted by the grand jury for defrauding the government out of public lands. Cunningham was fined \$5000, and the others who plead guilty were fined \$100 each. The case against Shaleford was withdrawn and execution of sentence suspended in the cases of O'Harra and Shelly Jones, as they had been of service to the government in the investigation of land fraud cases.
