As a voter, I say that if this bill should become a law upon a proposition to suppress the traffic in liquors in Lake county, I should vote for license to sell. But as applied to my own, country community, I should vote against license.

This is fair and just to all. This is the true republican, democratic, American practice. Give the people a chance by the secret ballot to regulate their local affairs, by voting Yes for No. 300 on your ballot next June.
