

Democratic Situation

Third party talk is becoming more and more frequent in the Hearst-Bryan faction of the democracy. The chances of these radicals forming another party increase in direct proportion with the chances of the conservative Parker-Cleveland element gaining control of the St. Louis convention. With the help of his numerous papers, a liberal supply of money and a large number of labor leaders, Hearst succeeded in building up a political machine that covers the entire country. Bryan and his democratic committee are Hearst's active allies. This radical faction has been fighting the conservative element in the democracy in every state in the union. In some it has been successful, in others snowed under. The fight will be carried to St. Louis and present indications point to the defeat of the radicals and a consequent split in the party.

Hearst represents the socialistic labor element and Bryan can swing the populists into line. The platform would probably declare for national ownership of railroads, telegraph, etc., for municipal ownership of public utilities, perhaps for a form of single tax, and on the money question for a compromise between the free silverites and greenbackers. There would be a radical anti-trust plank and many promises to catch the labor vote.

The new party could not hope to be successful but it might carry a few states and thereby get enough electoral votes to prevent either of the other parties getting a majority. The election of President would then be thrown into the House of Representatives, where the vote would be taken by states, New York having the same vote as Nevada. The present Congress would elect, and as two thirds of the states now have Republican majorities in the House, President Roosevelt would of course be chosen. The third party could thus gain only the balance of power between the older power in the House of Representatives. Hearst and Bryan as leaders of this faction would have some influence and could build plans for the future.

Will Hearst favor such a plan? Will he invest millions in a party, the formation of which would kill forever any chances he might have with the Democracy? This is a question which many politicians now answer in the affirmative. It is at all events an interesting one.
