## COUNTY COURT

May 18, 1904--Court met pursuant to adjournment, all officers present except W. A. Currier, commissioner, absent. When the following proceedings were transacted, to-wit:

Whereas, it appears from a petition duly presented to this court and numerously signed by the leading taxpayers and citizens of this county, that on or about April 26, 1904, near Benjamin lake, Lake county, which place is far remote from any settlement, about 2300 head of sheep were wantonly and unlawfully killed by some party or parties unknown to said petitioners, and that said petitioners urge that the county court of Lake county offer a reward for the arrest and conviction of said party or parties, and, whereas it appears from such evidence as has been obtained by the officers of said county that the parties who killed said sheep are non-residents of Lake county, Oregon.

Now, therefore, in conformity with law and to the end that justice may be done, it is hereby ordered that the county court of Lake county, Oregon, while sitting for the transaction of county business, do offer and promise to pay the sum of one thousand dollars for the arrest and conviction of said party or parties who have wantonly and unlawfully killed said sheep.

Court Adjourned.
