**TWO CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS.**

The two amendments to the State constitution, the Local Option Law and the Direct Primary nominating were questions that were freely discussed through the press during the campaign. The Examiner favored the Direct Primary law, which was carried in Lake county by 266 majority, but owing to the false front the Local Option law appeared to be wearing, this paper, while making no fight against it, did not advocate it. Behind the Local Option gauze front was firmly written "Prohibition," which cannot carry in Oregon unmasked. It is the opinion of The Examiner that should the Local option become a law in this state it will cause all sorts of controversies. It is well enough for the people in rural districts to enforce prohibition if their majority prefer it, but for a community, in working out their salvation, to prohibit the sale of liquor in towns seems hardly justice to the town whose population is not great enough to overcome the rural vote, yet at the same time, the people are not opposed to the sale of liquor in towns where city government regulate its distribution in a meet and equitable manner. Many states in the Union have tried prohibition and finally, like other experiments have discarded it and went back to the more conservative laws.

**Evolution of Heroism.**

Some time ago the dispatches announced that a Japanese shell exploded in General Stoessel's yard at Port Arthur and broke a rooster's leg. The Stockton Mail observed that "the rooster would live in history with the mule of Matanzas." The idea was not copyrighted, and therefore that paper cannot object to the following elaboration of it by Ambrose Pierce: "When the centuries have effected their deadly work, resolving history into fable, this immortal bird will stand forth on his one leg to preserve and glorify the memory of modern war. Prolonging our vision down the dim vistas of the future we behold him scratching upon the grave of the mule of Matanzas." "We modestly rise to ask, however, how a one-legged rooster can scratch."—Ex.
