Measure Water of Chewaucan.

The government engineer and party who are at work on the Chewaucan river are meeting with success that is very encouraging to the people of Chewaucan valley who are interested in the development of that section of the county. According to the Post when Mr. Lewis measured the stream at the bridge in Paisley last week, he found that 500 cubic feet of water was passing every second, and that the water in the stream was moving 7 feet per second. When the fact is taken into consideration that one fork of the stream runs out of the main channel above the bridge some distance besides two large irrigating ditches and the ditch that runs Geo. Conn's flour mill, which has water in it all the time, all taken from the river above where the measurement was made, the Chewaucan is quite a stream, and if it is practicable to store this large volume of surplus water for use on the arid lands in reach of it, the wealth of that part of the country would be several times multiplied.

Mr. Lewis is contemplating the establishment of a permanent gauging station at Paisley for computing the flow of the stream the year round, which may result in the government eventually undertaking an irrigating system in that valley, in the event of which much credit will be due Geo. Conn, for having incited the government to this work.
