Remember 1893 to 1897.

In determining how you shall vote for President this year, remember your condition, the state of business throughout the country, prevailing during the years 1893 to 1897.

The most artful politician cannot mislead you, if you will compare your present circumstances, and those of your neighbors, with conditions in that period.

You know when the change came in prosperity. You know of only one circumstance that could have created such an industrial and business revolution. That was the return of the republican party to power. If times had grown harder under government by the republicans, as a democrat, you would have charged it against that party; and you would have been justified in doing so. Now be true to yourself, your conscience, and the country. Credit the policies of the republican party, the honesty, firmness and wise statesmanship of Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. McKinley as more potent and influential than all other possible causes in bringing about your present prosperous condition.

There are always different causes which tend to promote prosperity in this country. There are always different causes which operate to destroy prosperity. No collection of better men ever assembled to govern a people than those who met at Washington in March 1893. But, they failed to check the forces, which brought on the universal distress of that period, though they honestly tried their best. The error must have been in this policy. It could not have been elsewhere. The policies of the democratic party are the same. If these policies were not the prime causes of general business stagnation and distress, they were incapable of restoring prosperity.

Prosperity did come with McKinley and his party, and immediately. Who can doubt that our immediate and continuous prosperity is in a large degree, if not altogether attributable to that change of government by the democratic party, to government by the republican party.

About mere theories, we may reasonably differ. We cannot differ as to our changed condition, and we do know that this change of conditions came with the restoration of the republican party to power. Which is the better guide, known facts, or theories.

Gresham Gazette, that's the name of a new paper just started in Gresham, Multnomah county, this state. W. W. Watson is its editor and proprietor. The No. 1 Vol. 1 of the Gazette appeared among our exchanges this week and a bright and newsy 4-page, 6-col., paper it is. Father of Our Townsman.

The funeral of Dr. Samuel Graham, who died in Sisson was held in Redding Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock from the Methodist church, Rev. R. E. Wenz officiated and the funeral was largely attended by friends of the family, who knew the deceased when he lived on Stillwater and in this city.

Five sons, John, Benton, Zeph, Chas. and Vick, followed the remains of their father to the last resting place in the Redding cemetery.

The music was furnished by a special choir managed by Mrs. Dr. C.H. Wheeler and directed by Miss Gussie Jackson. The quartet was composed of Miss Jackson, Maud Chenoweth, Ed Kern and Mark Firth. At the church and cemetery the choir sang "Over the Line," "Come ye Disconsolate," "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Shall We Gather at the River." Mrs. Wheeler and Miss Jackson sang "The Summer Land" at the church.

The pallbearers were Sam Brackins, C. C. Bush, D. N. Honn, Dr. O. J. Lawry, J. T. Tracey and Thos. Green.

Dr. Samuel Graham was born in Preble county, Ohio, on May 5, 1829. He came to California in 1882 and settled in Redding.

He was a graduate of the Electric School of Medicine in Cincinnati, Ohio, and commenced practicing in an infirmary in Loansport, Indiana, when he was 22 years of age.

He removed to Iowa where he remained until 1883, when he came to Shasta county. He practiced his profession in Millville for one year and then retired to private life.

Dr. Graham leaves the following children to mourn his loss: Charley, who conducts a tailoring establishment in Lewiston, Idaho, Vick and John D., of Sisson, Benton, Mrs. Dora Sasseen, of Sioux City, Iowa, Fitch Graham of Missouri, Clarence of Des Moines, Iowa, Arnold, of Lakeview, Oregon and Tildon whose present whereabouts are unknown although he was at Milwaukee a month ago.

Dr. Graham owned 160 acre of land on Stillwater and some town property in Copper City. He also possessed a land warrant that is quite a curiosity. It was issued in 1850 to a soldier (Dr. Graham's father-in-law) who served in the war of 1812. The warrant was transferred to Dr. Graham and has never been used.—From the Redding Free Press June 28.
