Frank Romer, of the 70 ranch in Lower Chewaucan took a crew of men and twelve mowers out to the ranch Monday to begin cutting hay. It was intended to start the machines Monday, but a heavy rain fell there Saturday evening, delaying work a day. Frank says the crop on the 70 ranch is good this year.

Last Thursday evening shortly after the electric lights were lighted, a thunder storm came up and threatened to burn out every light in town. One heavy clap of thunder fairly shook things and every light went out quick as a flash. In about an hour, however the electricians had the lights all going again.

### At the Woolgrowers Meeting.

The woolgrowers' meeting called for the 5th, at the courthouse in Lakeview was attended by 30 sheepmen of Lake county who were enthusiastic over the object of the meeting. Wm. Harvey was elected temporary chairman and J. N. Watson Secretary. Committees were appointed to confer with the State Woolgrowers Association and other county organizations for co-operation. The matter of building a warehouse in Lakeview and all woolgrowers hauling their wool here and advertising regular sale days, was favorably looked upon. This method of selling wool has proven satisfactory in other counties.

Another meeting will be called some time in August. A \$2000 reward was offered by the temporary organization for the arrest of parties responsible for the sheep killing. At the next meeting permanent organization will be effected.

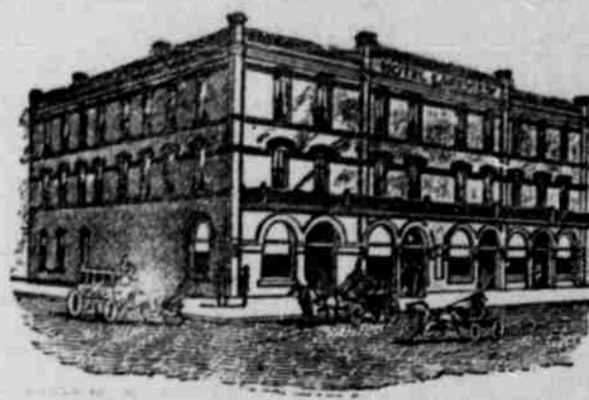
