Engineers Humphreys and Chapman, arrived in Alturas from Klamath county last Thursday, and on the same day Mr. Lippencott, head government engineer arrived here from below and was accompanied from Madeline by Mr. Evans. These gentlemen are all in the government employ and looking into the matters of artificial irrigation. Messrs Humphreys and Chapman will probably sound the waters of Goose Lake, after which they will return to Klamath county where they will be employed all season. Mr. Lippencott returned to the Southern part of the state, and Mr. Evans will remain in this county.—New Era.

Timber Lands to be Taxed Higher.

Reports from Shasta and Siskiyou counties in California, says the Klamath Republican, are to the effect that an increased valuation will be placed on timber lands by the assessor in these counties. The land will be valued at from \$5 to \$8.50 per acre, according to its proximity to the railroad.

The Republican further says:

"All timber land in Klamath county is now assessed at \$5 an acre, irrespective of location or valuation. This is really all timber land in this county will stand at present, as a too high tax will discourage investors. We can never expect the development of our timber resources unless we can interest capital. There is at present practically no market for our millions of feet of timber as it is unproductive, so its value is a thing of the future. Therefore our county should be careful not to place a restrictive tax on the timber lands until a market develops, when the valuation should be made according to the location, quality and quantity of timber on the land."

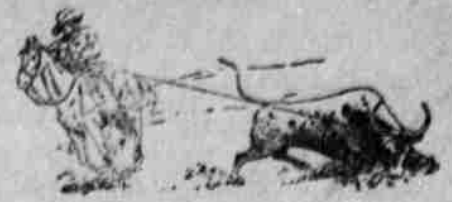

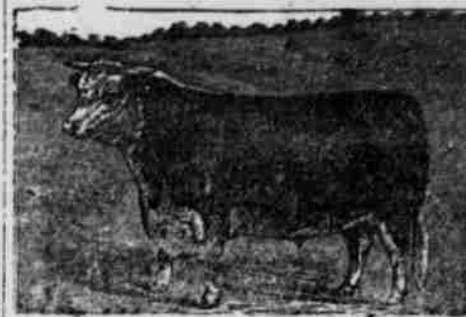
