Great Britain's Trade.

Up to now Britain retains from 20 to 25 per cent of the total trade of the universe. No other nation has yet come within half of this remarkable percentage. If we add the output of the colonies the British empire shows a record of about one-third of the trade of the whole world.

Maine's Forest Fires.

A Maine lumberman graphically states the loss through the forest fires to the people of Maine as equal to four years' cut on the Penobscot river and more than a year's cut in the entire state. Ten million eight hundred thousand dollars is the money value of the 800,000 acres of timber burned and the consequent loss to the various industries from stump to saw.
