Mosquitoes Present Their Bills.

Last week V. L. Snelling and Harry Balley made a trip to Warner to investigate their salt mine to see if it would produce any salt this season. They did not see any indications of salt and think the crop will be short, if they get any. Some years certain beds have no salt and this seems to be an off year for their mine. They were accompanied by J. M. Handley, F. M. Miller and son Vinty and A. L. Howell. Mr. Miller went on business connected with the 77 cattle ranch and Mr. Howell to get a horse. Jim Handley went along to make an estimate of the cost and lay plans for the contemplated bridge across the slough at Flag staff, north of Plush. A subscription is being raised to put a bridge there for the convenience of those who have occasion to cross the marsh, who now have to go about 40 miles north of Plush to cross. We understand if a reasonable sum is raised by subscription the county will assist in putting a bridge in. Mr. Handley says the slough at Flag Staff now is 126 feet wide and 9 feet deep, although a bridge can easily be constructed.

The boys took their guns along and a good supply of ammunition, but the largest game they saw was mosquitoes. They tell some pretty hard stories on the Warner mosquitoes. They declare that some very large ones would hold the bedclothing up while others would pay their respects to the occupants of the bed. Vince says that one mosquito about the size of a yearling calf alighted on Jim Handley's nose, and after taking in the situation offered to balance accounts.

Good Place to Dip Sheep.

At Joe Ambrose's dipping vats during the spring 18,000 sheep were dipped and 11,000 of that number were dipped twice. Those who dipped there were, A. L. Howell, 2,000, Ambrose, 1,000, Leahman, 2,000, Inquest, 3,500, Tonningsen, 4,000, Boydston, 5,500.

The total cost of material for dipping was \$279. For sulphur 33 sacks at \$5.50 per sack, 7 barrels of lime at \$7.50 per barrel and \$36 worth of Cooper's dip.

Stock Inspector Clarkson was well pleased with the method used at that vat.
