Utah has more than doubled its manufacturing plants since 1890, the number increasing from 530 to 1,400.

It ranks between yttrium and terbium and has an atomic weight of 17 and a spectrum in the ultra-violet region. In order to examine the spectrum an apparatus has been constructed which will measure to the one hundred thousandths of an inch.

A Strasburg aeronaut says he has seen an reagle at the height of 3,000 meters and again a pair of storks and a buzzard 900 meters above the sea level. On March 10, 1890, some aeronauts observed a lark flying at the height of 1,000 meters; on July 18, 1899, another balloon met a couple of crows at an altitude of 1,400 meters. These, however, are exceptions. Birds are hardly ever seer above a height of 1,000 meters; even above 400 meters they are not fre quent.
