Homes Found For Colonists.

At a recent meeting of the board of directors of the Oregon Information Bureau the report of the treasurer showed that the bureau now has a cash balance on hand of \$9283.10.

The other reports showed that there had been 563 visitors through the rooms of the bureau during the month of July. In the same time 30 colonists have been located in Jackson County alone through the efforts of the bureau, and 50 more have been brought from the East and placed upon farms in various parts of the state, some of them having been sent into the interior as far as Crook and Harney Counties. The efforts of the agents of the bureau are bringing daily additions to the exhibit placed in the offices at the Union Depot.—Oregonian
