WHO WILL BE FIRST?

We admit that the Chewaucan Post "scooped" us last week on a good railroad article. Mr. Keith secured it direct from headquarters, where a representative of the Post was at the time the information was given to the public regarding the railroad in question.

The new road, which the Post, as it quotes from the Boise, Idaho, Statesman, calls the Idaho, Wyoming & Pacific, may be only another name for the projected Western Pacific that is to be built through this country. It is evident that railroad men are interested in this section of Oregon and doubtless plans will be hurried to put a road through here. As the Post says editorially no large railroad can depend upon subsidy to put a road through a country, and no scheme like the Idaho, Wyoming & Pacific will allow a failure to raise a subsidy stand in the way of railroad construction.

The route laid out for this road is a feasible one and one that we have held out all along offered most encouragement for Lakeview. The route from Harney county is a direct one to Abert Lake where lies the immense beds of potash, thence along an easy line to Crooked Creek and Goose Lake valleys, and down the west side of the lake into Modoc county. All this stretch of country is comparatively level and no extensive grading will be required. There is not a trans-continental line running to the Pacific Coast that has a route as free from mountains as this route, and again the route passes through a country that, when given transportation facilities, would be a productive one, and would put a road upon a paying basis from the time the first train was run through. Thousands and thousands of acres of rich agricultural lands, now being used for pasture only, would furnish traffic for a railroad the first year.

This scheme may expect to find opposition in Western Oregon, as the project offers no encouragement for gaining the trade of Eastern Oregon for Western Oregon ports.

Portland has been striving to gain the trade of Eastern Oregon, that rightfully belongs to them, but every effort seems to be headed off by San Francisco interests, and it is only a matter of time to predict that Portland will eventually get its just dues.

The people of this part of the state have been jolled so long about railroads that they are not likely to reject even a line giving them an outlet to San Francisco, for the promises of a home market.

For campaign literature the Democrats are using excerpts from the writings of Theodore Roosevelt. Mr. Roosevelt has written many books, and from these the Democrats think they can find passages that will be detrimental to his campaign. The man who has done and said as many great things as Theodore Roosevelt, and never spoke a word that went against the grain of any man, is an idle prattler.

There is very little that Judge Parker has said that can be used against him in the campaign, for he has said nothing.

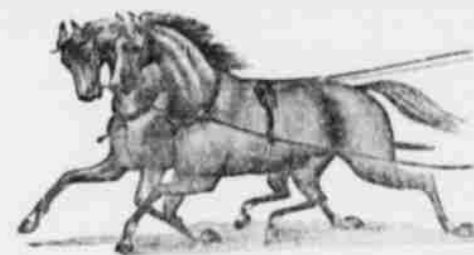
