DEMOCRATIC MONEY-BAG

Rothschild, the great money man, has agents representing him all over the world.

In New York his agent is August Belmont.

Mr. August Belmont, is the man who really nominated Parker for President. He is the manager and moneybag of the present national wing of the Democratic party. His word is their law. Mr. Belmont has moved from Wall Street to the national headquarters with his clerks, stenographers and confidential men, and has plunged into the work with great zest.

While Belmont nominally runs the underground railroad, and nominally refuses decent pay to the men that are to work as engineers, Rothschild really controls New York's underground road. And it is really Rothschild that refuses to give to workmen, whom he will never see and who represent mere dividends to him, decent American wages.

Rothschild, among his other curious fads, is a collector of fleas. Probably many thought it a joke when they read in the papers that Rothschild had paid five thousand dollars for two fleas from the body of the Arctic fox. But it was no joke at all. This man with the great fortune has actually managed to fix his mind on fleas, and he has a marvelous collection of them—the flea of the tiger, of the lion, of the polar bear, and many others, and of the Arctic fox, just acquired.

There are all kinds of foolish spendthrifts in the world; ordinarily it would be a waste of time to talk about the European moneybag and his collection of fleas.

But his cold and clammy attitude—purely financial—toward the working men on his New York underground road, forms a rather interesting contrast to his ardent enthusiasm for the flea of the Arctic fox.

You know that there is going to be a strike on the elevated railroad in New York city, in all probabilities, because Rothschild, through his agent, Belmont, refuses to pay his men—capable engineers to run the fast trains—three dollars and a half a day.

Wouldn't it be a good thing, in some way, to make Rothschild pay his American workmen decently, even if he had to give up buying fleas at five thousand dollars a pair.

He might, at least, get along with a commoner kind of flea, and give

his American workmen the benefit of the difference.

All workmen and all citizens ought to take interest in this Rothschild and his flea collecting mania.

They ought to say to Rothschild in a way that he would understand: "First, if you please, you'll pay your workmen decently, make your underground railroad, where American people risk their lives, as safe as you can, by hiring decent, competent men—after that buy all the fleas you want and pay for them as much as you want.

As a result of the efforts of the Examiner to get better mail service we are now receiving our Portland mail in two and a half days. The best that has been done before was three and a half for Portland evening mail and four days for the morning mail. We are in receipt of correspondence informing us that the Assistant Superintendent of Railway Mail Service, F. W. Vaille, is now in San Francisco and has the matter up before the authorities there, and it is likely that within a short time a marked change will be noticed in the western mail. Of course a 24 hour gain is pretty good, but we expect still more of a change before long. These matters consume time, and eventually Lakeview may expect to get its mail at the earliest possible moment.

Frank W. Higgins was nominated for governor of New York on the Republican ticket on the 15th, after a warm contest. The State platform endorses the present administration, and the ticket is pledged the support of the party.

The Democrats of Oregon are figuring on Grover Cleveland coming to Oregon to speak. The most interesting thing about a trip to Oregon for the ex-president will be the good fishing.

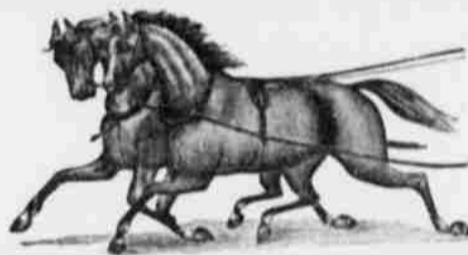
