The Lewis & Clark gold souvenir dollars are to be sold for two dollars each, or 6 for ten dollars.

Expert timber men estimate the loss of timber by fire the past month in Columbia county alone, at a billion feet.

The question of the right of way for the portage road up the Columbia has been settled and surveys are now on the ground. Construction work will begin at once as soon as contracts can be let.

The State Board of Barbers have decided to enforce the law requiring barbers to procure a license, and also to display their license. The Board has given out that after Oct. 2d, all barbers in the state who have not renewed their license will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

We have already found one or two who are not in favor of Lake county making even a livestock exhibit at the Lewis & Clark fair next year. There may be more but whether they will take enough interest in the welfare of their county to even express their views through the press, we do not know.

The Lakeview correspondent to the Portland Telegram in a late issue of that paper claims to have interviewed many Lake County sheep men on the subject of Hon. J. N. Williamson's proposed method of settling the range trouble in the public land states, with the result that sheepmen are not in favor of locating large tracts of range, say from 1000 to 2000 acres, as provided in Congressman Williamson's proposed measure. Claiming that it will be better to let the range alone just as it is.

After a long and hot battle between the contending forces in the Democratic party, a solution of the most vital point was reached in New York on the 21st, that of a candidate for governor. This important question seemed destined to split the democratic party in twain in the Empire state. At a "love feast" in Albany, David B. Hill and his life-long enemy, Justice D. Cady Herrick "kissed and made up again," and Herrick was made the compromise candidate or governor of New York. Then all factions of the party gathered in loving embrace and adopted a platform which includes

a direct personal attack upon Governor Odell, as well as a general denunciation of the Republican administration.

Stock News.
(Klamath Express.)

Within the last week the following bands of live stock have passed through Merrill bound for Montague and Gazelle to be shipped to the San Francisco, Oakland and Sacramento markets. The X L Company had 580 in charge of James Poor.

Chas. Horton and R. Kilgore were at Frank Graybael's last Tuesday, with 380 head consigned to the Oakland Meat Co.

Del. Brattain passed through Mindall with 210 head for the same firm. N. S. Drew and J. P. Hazen had 180 head for the same firm.

Mr. Hammond, of Ft. Klamath had 200 head for Poz. Clayburgh & Co., of San Francisco. Fred Melbase, of the Fort, had 200 cows for Poz. Clayburgh & Co.

Louis Gerber had 1200 mutton sheep in charge of Walter Buckmaster, pass through town for Montague. The drive will probably be the biggest ever known here. It is estimated that 15,000 head of cattle will be taken out of Klamath county within the next four months.
