RAILROADS ARE ADVERTISING.

The following editorial in the Portland Oregonian is proof of the interest that is being taken in advertising. Advertising is the life of any business, and to doubt this fact or neglect advertising is to slight your business in such a way that nothing less than renewed activity in advertising can gain back what has been lost. Read what the Oregonian says: "It has been noted of late and comment upon the matter has been freely indulged, that railroads have or some time been taking considerable space in newspapers, on billboards and by other means commonly used for the dissemination of commercial knowledge or information. Formerly content with routine and unattractive notices after the manner of time tables in the daily press' the big railway systems have taken a new departure and are becoming the most liberal, systematic and attractive of advertisers. Though slow converts to the value of printer's ink, they now not only vie with but bid fair to eclipse minor commercial enterprises in the effort to make known their business and its facilities. In brief, the great captains of transportation have discovered with the rest of the commercial world that when anyone has anything good to offer the public he must advise the public of the fact in a way that will catch and hold its attention.

Though transportation companies have but lately, relatively speaking, awakened to the value of systematic and attractive advertising, the results have proved substantial. Thus the annual increase of 100,000 settlers in Northwestern Canada that has been recorded for a few years past, has been secured through the liberal use of printer's ink. Booklets embellished with photographic views of some of the most magnificent scenery in the world make attractive reading, on railway trains and in the homes of intending immigrants. The Canadian Interior Department has taken a hand in disseminating knowledge concerning the vast available area of Canadian lands, using many columns of newspaper space for this purpose and paying for it handsomely and ungrudgingly. What has been called a "huge campaign of advertising" has done more for the West in five years than the slow processes of mouth to mouth advertisement could have done in five times that period. Furthermore, it is found that through ad-

vertisement of the advantages which almost every railway line possesses in some particular over other lines is a part of modern transportation business only less necessary to its success than is a safe roadbed or approved rolling stock. Enterprise in this line, as in all others, stimulates enterprise and competition begets competition."
