"The Democratic party is not a machine," says Judge Parker. No, just a collection of scraps.

Parker advised the editors to avoid personal references in an uncomplimentary way to workers in their party. Who asked him to say that—Hill.

The best indication of the feeling of the American people is found in the fact that merchants are buying goods, confident that business is not to be disturbed by a change of administration.

Democratic orators are calling attention to the strikes in various parts of the country. Workmen sometimes walk out in Republican administrations. They are thrown out in Democratic days.

Among the other charges of extravagance, Judge Parker omitted to call attention to the fact that the interest on the government debt was \$9,000,000 less last year than it was under Mr. Cleveland's administration.

Commissioner McAdoo of New York has made up his mind the police trials are a failure and he will ask for legislation to prevent men dismissed on serious charges from being reinstated by decisions of higher courts based on technicalities.

Judge Parker complains that the expense of the administration under President Roosevelt is greater than that under Cleveland. Yes, and the government is paying the expense in cash instead of adopting the Cleveland plan of borrowing money in times of profound peace.

Speaking of extravagance, Judge Parker failed to tell his audience of Democratic editors that President Cleveland increased the national debt in his administration, in a time of profound peace, more than President McKinley did in the Spanish-Philippine wars.

That veteran journalist and theatrical manager, John Hollingshead, who wrote for Charles Dickens in Household Words, founded the London Gaiety theater, abolished fees in theaters there and is the great authority on theatrical lore in London, is 77 years old.

Twenty-one years ago, when we were at the height of prosperity, immigration ran to 788,000 people in a year. Ten years ago hard times cut the immigration down to a third of that number. Last year again we went up to 857,000, but these immigrants were not, as heretofore, farmers, but went to swell the numbers of unskilled labor in our great cities.
