Local optimists are very busy these days.

Our contemporary began the construction of a new railroad last week. He is going to have an electric railroad from Lakeview to Red Bluff, a distance of 240 miles, to be constructed by local capitalists. That would be easy; it would not cost more than about five million dollars.

We have read everything we could find that Wm. J. Bryan has said in this campaign, and can glean but one possible motive for his supporting Parker, and that is, that it will be easier for Bryan to lead the democratic party in 1908 if Parker is elected this November than if Roosevelt prosperity continues. Now, the question is, is Bryan's interest yours?

The rumor has been current for two weeks past that Senator C. W. Fulton would speak in Lake and Klamath counties some time in this month, but nothing definite can be learned of the contemplated trip of the Senator who is now traveling with Senator Fairbanks. Senator Fulton would be warmly welcomed to Lake county, and everybody would turn out to hear him speak.

Secretary Hitchcock's investigation of the land frauds was heartily approved by every honest man, but the method he used in stopping such frauds was greatly detrimental to the West and has had its effect. Development of the Western states was greatly hampered by the secretary's forest reserve propensities, and all Western people are protesting. It is understood that Hitchcock's resignation will be gladly accepted by President Roosevelt about March 4th. A new secretary is strongly talked of.

The climax was reached in the natural disagreement in democratic ranks and a most horrible blunder was made when Tom Taggart attempted to bring about a reconciliation of the powers to be in the democratic party, Grover Cleveland and Wm. J. Bryan, at a great democratic rally, in which Cleveland was to preside and Bryan was to be one of the principal speakers. Bryan pointedly refused to cooperate with Cleveland, and only then was the blundering attempt to promote harmony discovered. The chairman of the democratic National Committee was at once exiled to Indiana, and the management of the campaign was practically turned over to the Belmont forces.

County Court Proceedings

October 7th, 1904.

Court met pursuant to adjournment, all officers present except W. A. Currier, absent. When the following proceedings were had, to-wit: Sealed bids being filed with the Court by The Lake County Examiner and Lakeview Herald to publish the delinquent Tax Roll, as is required by law, and as each bid was for 2 1/2 cents per line, and as The Lake County Examiner is the official newspaper for Lake County the said printing is hereby awarded to said official newspaper.

It appearing to the Court that the sheriff of Lake County, Oregon, has returned the Tax Roll for the year 1903 as required by law, it is hereby ordered by the County Court that the said Tax Roll be returned to the Sheriff with a warrant attached thereto, commanding said Sheriff to proceed by law to collect the delinquent taxes as are delinquent on said Roll.

It is further ordered that said Sheriff proceed to give notice of sale of the real property for delinquent taxes thereon, by publishing such notice in The Lake County Examiner, a weekly newspaper published at Lakeview, in said County, which said newspaper is hereby designated as the most likely to give notice to actual delinquent tax payers, and with which newspaper and its proprietor, C. O. Metzker, the Court has entered into a contract to make such publication at the rate of 2 1/2 cents per line nonpartial type, the said contract being on file in the office of the county Clerk of said county.
