Doing Campaign Duty in East.
Mrs. M. L. Woodcock of Portland who has been working for the election of "Roosevelt," as she calls the president, has gone to Chicago. She gave the political workers so much trouble in Portland that they have advised her to go East where the field was larger and needed her assistance more than Oregon did. When she arrived in Chicago she went direct to the National headquarters. Chairman Malvane left for New York as soon as he was informed that Mrs. Woodcock was coming to see him, and the woman was directed to Mrs. Alice Willard, who has charge of the woman's bureau. Mrs. Woodcock exhibited her big bag with the picture of Roosevelt on it and freely distrib-

ed the Roosevelt buttons that adorned the front of her dress to the bystanders. Mrs. Willard failed to find out what the woman wanted and called the bell boy to see her safely out of the building. Mrs. Woodcock said that she was a member of the National Republican committee in Oregon, but that Chairman Baker was jealous of her, and she could do no good in Oregon so came East.

Mrs. Woodcock imagines she is doing good work for Roosevelt, and has been edged on by some of the political workers just for the fun of seeing her work. She is not crazy, but on the verge, and one more step in that direction would land her in the "bug house."

N. C. O. Ry. Surveyors.
Uly McCabe was down from Lakeview this week. He informs us that the N. C. O. Ry. surveyors are now working near that place. They have experienced great difficulty in getting down the mountain on the west side, and are going back to run a line along the east side of the canyon. The engineer informed Mr. McCabe that if he could find room to make a Z on the West side he would be able to make the descent, otherwise the east side would of necessity be chosen. The fall in three miles from Dry Creek is about 1,000 feet. Of course this must be overcome in some way. The work is very slow and great care is being taken, every cut, turn, and grade being accurately fixed. Mr. McCabe thinks the surveyors will be several weeks yet before the route down the mountain is definitely established. After that accomplished, however, the work from there to Alturas will be comparatively easy, and but a short time will be required to complete the survey.

No work beyond establishing the line will be done before spring, when grading and laying the track will begin in earnest, and before snow flies next fall Alturas will hear the shriek of the iron horse.—Alturas Plaindealer.
