Two freight trains collided near Reno on the 20th, in the snow sheds. The engine and several cars were demolished and caught fire. Superintendent R. J. Laws of the S. P. Co., dropped dead from heart failure during the excitement. Several freight cars with their contents the engine and 2000 feet of snow shed are a total loss.

A broken wheel on an eastbound cattle train of 54 cars caused the train to jump the track on a bridge across the Truckee river, 17 miles west of Reno, on the 20th, and 17 of the cars loaded with cattle were dumped into the river 100 feet below the bridge. The engine and caboose and several cars remained on the track, thus saving the crew.

The prohibitionists have undertaken to make such a sweeping victory out of the local option law passed last spring that they have the law in such a muddle now that there is little hope of even getting as much encouragement as they did at the June election. Radicals were not satisfied to let the law alone and permit it to work according to the intentions of the framers, and are apt to taste defeat for the whole measure as a result of their interference.

The people of Northern Lake county are jubilant over the increase in the frequency of their mail service from the north. A six-times-a-week schedule has been ordered by the department between Prineville and Silver Lake, which was formerly a twice-a-week service. This schedule gives all northern Lake county and Southern Crook county a daily service from Shaniko, the terminus of the Columbia Southern, to Lakeview. Paisley and towns north of there will now get their Portland mail from the north in shorter time than they have formerly received it over the western route.
