The Portland Oregonian will say in its issue of Oct. 31st, in its forecast of the vote by counties: Registration in Lake county has reached 783, eight votes were registered during the time the registration books were open this fall. It is estimated that the vote will fall 100 short of the registration, and 415 are conceded to Roosevelt, 225 to Parker, 30 to Watson and 10 to Swallow.

As a result of republican investigation of registration lists in New York, 10,000 fraudulent registrations were discovered. Governor Odell stated that these cases would be taken into court. Both the registers and the parties guilty of the scheme will be prosecuted. Large numbers of voters were imported from Chicago and other cities to swell New York's vote for Parker.
