Where Will the Trade Go?

Harriman has bought the Columbia Southern and as a result Portland is indulging in pleasant dreams. Portland forgets that Harriman uses his roads and influence to aid San Francisco rather than Portland, and his latest move is more likely to be a scheme to put Portland to sleep again while he pushes other lines into Central Oregon than a means of immediate relief to Oregon's metropolis. The N.C.O. road is rapidly extending into this portion of Oregon and if there was ever any danger of the trade of South-eastern Oregon being diverted to Portland over the C. S. Ry., it is certainly averted now, since Harriman has come into control of that line. The Oregonian believes that if Harriman does not extend the Columbia Southern he will build an east and west road through Central Oregon. Such a road, and Mr. Harriman knows it as well as other men who are acquainted with the topography of the country east of the Cascades, cannot control the trade of this section, or any great part of it. Nothing but a north and south road can give Eastern Oregon adequate service, and this is what is promised by the N.C.O. An east and west road might be built, but the promoters of such a scheme would not have in view the relief of conditions in Eastern Oregon. It would only effect an eastern outlet for coast trade without having to go to Portland for transfer on eastern roads. A cross-country road, mapped out as the Corvallis & Eastern, would cross Eastern Oregon at a point where the agricultural belt is narrowest, and practically all the traffic such a road could hope to take up would be the timber in the vicinity of Bend. Agricultural pursuits in that region are wholly dependent upon the irrigation systems now being boomed for the benefit of the few who have invested money, and in which very few people have any faith. It will only be a matter of a very few years when the experiment of irrigating the lava beds of that section will be found to be a failure and all the vast holdings of the irrigation companies now operating there will go into the hands of some big livestock company and the settlers will be "kicked out."

The N.C.O. will build to Lakeview, and possibly as far north as Silver Lake, and what traffic there is between there and Shaniko will be divided between those two places, with the possible exception of a few head of beef cattle and a few thousand feet of lumber which might be taken to a watering station on the Corvallis & Eastern near the bank of the Deschutes somewhere, where water for the engine could be pumped from the river to fill the engine tank before starting across the desert for Burns, the next watering station. The Corvallis & Eastern trains will go puffing across the 87,000-acre aggregation, carrying its cargo of Coos Bay lumber to Salt Lake, exciting only an occasional cow grazing on the vast juniper desert.
