Eastern wool buyers are said to be buying up the 1905 clip in Utah, paying 16 to 18 cents, with an advance of enough to bind the trade. This is supposed to be the beginning of a scheme to corner the 1905 wool clip. Our sheep men should guard against such a monopoly by refusing to dispose of their next year's clip until it is well known what the price will be a shearing time. If middle men can afford to buy up wool now, 7 or 8 months before it can be delivered to them and pay a portion of the purchase price down, our sheepmen can afford to hold their wool until the market is open. This class of buyers are shrewd and look for producers who are in money straits, and there being none here, it is not likely they can get much of a hold on Oregon wool. Oregon wool has reached a place in the world's great wool markets where it is sure to be sought after, even at the top price and producers need have no anxiety about selling their 1905 clip.

The Pacific Homestead on the 19th of this month issued the most elaborate inland Empire edition we have had the pleasure to see. The Homestead is the best farm weekly on the coast and its claim to the widest circulation is not doubted. They announced that two car loads of paper and 200 pounds of ink were used in this special edition. It contains 108 pages, the regular size of the Homestead, magnificently illustrated with photographs of farms, towns, stock, scenery and all things of interest to be found in Oregon, and especially Eastern Oregon, as far south as the Crook-Lake county line. Crook county is magnificently represented in this number which, no doubt, will be of vast value to the county. Every town, farm, stock ranch, mine, and every industry is shown in well-printed half-tone and elaborately written up.

It has been necessary throughout the summer to devote more or less space to political issues where papers were in any way concerned about politics and the publisher who was absolutely non-committal on this great question could not have been sufficiently enamored with his country to inspire a patriotic sentiment. But now that the campaign is ended, there is nothing to say of it further than to give the news of the result to readers. Our attention will now be devoted to the upbuilding of Lake county and supplying our readers with the latest local happenings and keep them in touch with the more important events of the world as they may occur from time to time.

Thomas E. Watson has gone to New York, where he goes to confer with radical Democratic, Social, Populist and Labor leaders, concerning either the launching of a new party, or to lay plans for the capture of what is left of the Democratic party, so that they can reorganize it to suit the extreme views they hold. Hearst is the leader of the movement, so far as the East is concerned, and Watson appears to be about the whole movement in the South. Watson said in regard to the death of Bryan, as to his participation in the new movement, that it was never intended that Bryan should be present at the first council of the new party or revamping of the old one. Watson is out and out for a new party and is sincere in his belief that there is a revolution coming in the politics of the country, and that he is the man to lead it.

Governor Chamberlain, in discussing the result of the election, says in substance, that nothing could have been done to materially change the result of the election, neither in framing a platform or in selecting a candidate, and so far as he can see the Republican party will win in 1908, unless new issues arise upon which the democratic party can frame a platform. Governor Chamberlain does not make plain why, if new issues arise the republican party are not as capable of coping with these new issues along with those already mastered as the democrats.

It is estimated that the republicans will control the lower house of congress by 108, against 34 at the last session. Out of the 28 governors to be elected 17 are republicans and 9 democrats, while Minnesota and Nebraska are yet in doubt as to the election of governor, however, both these states have a full republican house at Washington.

A secret investigation of the rail way mail service has been going on for two months. It has been the practice to weigh the mails for a short time every four years just prior to letting contracts to railroad companies, and it is charged that the mails have been increased during this short period and contracts let on that basis.

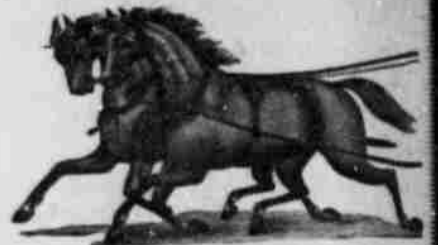
