Features of the Local Option Law.

The Local Option law is unsatisfactory to even strong advocates of the measure when it was first proposed...

Prohibitionists are girding themselves to fight the amendment of the local-option law in the coming legislative session...

The chief demand of the revisionists is for an amendment that will permit an elector to vote his own precinct "dry" without voting for prohibition in the whole county...

On the other hand, if the county majority be "wet," then liquor can be sold only in such precincts as go "wet," and in those that go "dry" prohibition must be enforced...

Again, if an election results in favor of prohibition, the issue cannot be brought to a vote again for two years; but if against prohibition, the issue can be brought up every year.

If an election for a whole county goes for prohibition, "no" election can thereafter be held in any subdivision or precinct thereof until after prohibition has been defeated at a subsequent election for the same purpose held for the whole county...

Those advantages of the prohibition side revisionists will seek to have removed from the law.

A novelty in the way of a labor saving device is the electric whitewashing contrivance, which is being used in finishing the interiors of the buildings now in course of construction for the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition...

There will be no exhibits permitted in Festival Hall at the Lewis and Clark Exposition at Portland next year. The building which will seat more than 2,500 persons, will be used for concerts, lectures and conventions.

Failed to Corral Elk.

Bakersfield, November 14.—After two days' work by thirty-five expert vaqueros, the attempt to corral the band of 150 elk now at large on the Miller & Lux ranch near this city and to transport them to the Government reservation has been abandoned...

The latest report from the ranch this afternoon stated that ten elk had been shipped, five had died from exhaustion after being run down and one had been lost in the hills. An expert cattlemen stated this afternoon that if the present methods are pursued it will require a force of 1500 vaqueros to accomplish the work.
