THE PRIMARY LAW.

The Oregonian seems to be going back on the direct primary law and classes it with other "crank dogmas." Why the Oregonian is taking such a stand against a law that has not yet been tried, and will not be until 1906, only in a few city elections—and only a few where politics cut any figure—we cannot understand. The Oregonian was a supporter of this measure, and even went so far as to say that had not the Oregonian given the measure its support it would not have been adopted. The primary law was elected by the people, and carried an overwhelming majority, and until tried, how are we to know that the law is not based on sound judgment and anti-bossism principles?

The Examiner supported the measure too, and it was carried in Lake county by a big majority. If, when tried, the primary law proves to be a "crank dogma," we will be found working for its repeal.

Oregon's complete official count shows that the state gave Roosevelt 4266. The Oregonian made a mistake in the telegram sent from Lake county and gave the majority here as 227, when it should have been 397, a difference of 70 votes. The total vote in the state is—Republican 60,523, Democrat 17,457, Prohibition 3,861, Socialist 7,615, Peoples 782.

The diphtheria is said to be about a thing of the past in the Bieber country, but Alturas papers report cases of it at Merrill, Klamath county. Modoc county is talking of quarantining against Lake. We presume so our people will be safe as it is reported diphtheria is at Alturas. However, doctors there say it is not diphtheria.

There seems to be quite a mining excitement at Paisley. Nearly every man in that vicinity who has a penny goes for delving into the earth for gold have located claims. Some good specimens of ore have been brought out of the mines and show fine assays. We hope it will be a success.

The character of country in the Lakeview section is being established at Portland, estimates of Oregon cattle sales in 1903 not over \$1,000,000. On the ranges last year there were 70,000 head valued at \$15,000,000. The Eastern demand for Oregon cattle is enormous and exceeds the supply.

The livestock market continues to improve. Both cattle and sheep are quoted stronger, and there is prospect for a good advance in prices before long.

Statistics show that the potato crop of the United States this season reached the enormous output of 588,700,000 bushels, the largest crop known.

Severe storms prevailed in the Eastern States last week. We may expect to get a little weather before long.

Gen. Lew Wallace, author of Ben Hur, is said to be dying at his home in Indianapolis, Indiana.

A. B. Parker has taken up a law practice in New York with a firm of Trust lawyers.

GENERAL NEWS OF IMPORTANCE.

The news of the Roosevelt landslide came first to the President's ears from one of his sons, while he was at dinner. The boy had been watching for the returns in the Executive offices; he outran the messengers and burst into the dining room with: "Pop! You've carried New York by a big majority."

A shooting scrape took place in Sheridan, Yamhill county, on the 16, in which John Dickins proprietor of a hotel fatally shot Marve Potter, a laborer. Jealousy was the cause of the shooting. Potter was shot three times, once in the mouth and twice in the back.

The Annual report of the second-assistant Postmaster-General shows that U. S. Government paid for inland mail transportation during the last fiscal year \$67,931,430, and for foreign mails, \$2,156,053.

Roosevelt will offer Senator Cockrell (democrat) of Missouri a place on the Civil Service Commission at the expiration of Cockrell's term as U. S. Senator, March 4th.

Ex-Governor Frank S. Black of New York has been promised the Attorney-Generalship in President Roosevelt's cabinet at the beginning of his term, March 4th.

President Roosevelt will loose no time in filling the places made vacant in Alaska by the discharge of Judge M. C. Brown and Marshal Frank Richard.

Governor Pardee, of California was elected president of the National Irrigation Congress, at its session at El Paso, Texas.

A portion of the Columbia River Jetty was damaged during the recent storm. Some of the trestles were destroyed.

The National Grange held its 34th annual session last week in Portland, many important topics were discussed.

The legality of the election in Jackson county upon the question of prohibition will be tested in the courts.

Portland Ore., was selected as the next meeting of the National Irrigation Congress on the first ballot.

Senator Mitchell bid his friends in Portland good bye and started for Washington, D. C., on the 15th.

A dispatch from St. Petersburg states that the czar has ordered the surrender of Port Arthur.

The Southern Pacific lines in Oregon are to receive repairs to the amount of \$3,000,000.

Local Option has put six counties under prohibition, and 163 saloons are thus effected.

It is believed that construction work on the portage road will be begun soon.

Andrew Carnegie has offered \$10,000 for a library for Negroes at Atlanta Georgia.

General Stoessel was not hurt much. He was only shot in the head.

The \$600,000 for the National McKinley Monument has been raised.

Klamath Falls is planning to build a \$20,000 high school in the spring.

The Republicans have won in the Colorado election contest case.

Senator C. W. Fulton started for Washington, D. C. Tuesday.

One of the Cody Wyoming Bank robbers has been captured.

No settlement has yet been reached in the North Sea Tragedy.

PAPER TRADE IN TURKEY. Reeder - & - Barbarick

In 1903 \$400,000 Worth of the Article for Making Cigarettes Was Imported.

In the year 1903 Turkey in Europe imported paper and cardboard to the value of about \$500,000 and cigarette paper to the value of \$400,000. Austria and Italy were the chief sources of supply. The German consul at Saloniki says large quantities of all sorts of paper, including wall paper, enter that port for distribution throughout Turkey. This paper trade is in Austrian hands. Different manufacturers in Austria combine in sending out commercial travelers to Turkey, one traveler showing the products of several Austrian paper mills. The German consul general at Constantinople, in a report to his government, says that Turkey is one of England's best markets for cotton yarns and cotton piece goods, taking in 1903 nearly \$2,500,000 worth of cotton yarns and \$15,700,000 worth of cotton piece goods. Within the last few years Italy has greatly increased her exports of cotton textiles to Turkey and is becoming a strong competitor of England in that market. If American manufacturers of cotton goods were to give energetic and intelligent attention to the Turkish market, they would probably find it a good one.

TORTOISE FIGHT IS FUNNY
