

NEED ALL-ROUND EDUCATION

Desire for Physical Development Comes to Parents Slowly—The Views of One Mother.

It is a curious fact that the desire for physical development for their children comes to many parents more slowly than that for intellectual development, says Youth's Companion. It is greatly well acknowledged now by everybody—from the illiterate immigrant to the "poor white"—that "book-learning" is a good thing for the children. INCUBATOR ON DESERT.

Birds in Vast Wastes Cool Their Eggs Instead of Giving Them Warmth.

Many a person who has watched a mother robin nesting patiently on her eggs in a blossoming apple tree has wondered how the little creature or her ancestors ever learned that the long process would cause the eggs to hatch. A greater puzzle is set for them, says the author of "The Land of Little Rain," in the great desert, where the same birds have learned to cool their eggs instead of warming them. In the unsheltered nests of the sandy plains it becomes necessary to keep the eggs from cooking. One hot, stifling spring in the Little Antelope, a traveler had occasion to pass and retrace the nest of a pair of meadow-larks located unhappily in the shade of a very slender weed. The birds were never sitting except at night, but at midday they stood or drooped above the nest, half-fainting, with pitifully parted bills, spreading their wings between the sun and the eggs. Sometimes both of them together, with wings spread and half-lifted, maintained a spot of shade in a terrific temperature. Their patience was in this case rewarded, for the compassionate traveler at last spared them a bit of canvas, which she mounted over the nest as a permanent shelter.

UNPROFITABLE FEEDING

Intelligent stock raisers know that a certain amount of food is necessary to keep an animal alive. They might feed that amount as long as it lives, and it would never gain a pound.

There is no profit in that kind of feeding. The kind that pays is the kind that builds flesh rapidly. If it takes twenty pounds of food each day to keep a sheep alive, twenty-five pounds a day will make it gain flesh. It's the extra five that brings the profit. The first five pounds amounts to nothing, nor does the second or third or fourth five pounds.

It's the same way with advertising. You have to do a certain amount to overcome the resistance of the public.

You have to do a certain amount of advertising to make them wake up to the fact that you are in business at all. You have to pay a certain amount to keep your advertising alive. What you pay above that amount brings profit.

Some advertisers fail because they do not use enough space. They use barely enough or sometimes not quite enough to make the advertising self-sustaining. A little bit more would make it profitable. It is better to advertise a little too much than not quite enough.—Charles Austin Bate.
