### THE LAND FRAUD CASES.

The conspiracy case of the United States of America against Emma L. Wilson, S. A. D. Puter, Marie L. Wade, Horace G. McKinley, D. W. Tansley, Frank H. Walgamot et al. has been tried, the testimony is all in, and District Attorney John H. Hall has made his statement to the jury. For twenty days the attorneys on both sides have been struggling one on the other for conviction, on the other for acquittal. The evidence has been damaging for the defense. Frank H. Walgamot has sickened of the case, and has, at the last minute, changed his plea of "not guilty" to that of "guilty," to the irreparable prejudice of the chances of the other parties defendant. At the request of Special Prosecutor Frank H. Heney, Miss Ware will be recommended for acquittal by the court, and the charge to the jury is given on the ground that she has not been sufficiently identified with the conspiracy in the present case. The defendants are waiting for the judgment of Judge Thomas O'Day on their behalf, the answer by Mr. Heney and the charge to the jury, and which is expected to have been finished by Monday evening.

If these people are found guilty each of them, will be liable to a fine ranging from \$1000 to \$10,000 or imprisonment in the county jail or at McNell's Island, extending from 1 day to 2 years, or both fine and imprisonment at the discretion of the court and jury.

Young Weber, the accused murderer and bank robber, has been indicted on all of the counts. The money was found in the Weber barn, and a case is now pending as to ownership.

In our opinion the penitentiary is not the place for good men, but if Senator Mitchell's statement to Commissioner Richards of the general land office, that S. A. Puter "is one of the best men in Oregon," is to be accepted as a fact, jail will be full of good men.

### Her Suffering Ended in Death.

The sad news reached here last Thursday, Dec. 1st, that Mrs. Walter Duke died in Sacramento on Wednesday, Nov. 26th. Mrs. E. M. Brown started to Sacramento on Tuesday and reached Alturas when she heard of her sister's death.

The remains of Mrs. Duke was brought to Alturas and laid to rest in the Alturas cemetery on Saturday. Many weeping relatives and friends attended the funeral. Mrs. Duke was the daughter of A. M. Smith, who lives near Willow Ranch, and was married to Walter Duke about 7 years ago. Mr. and Mrs. Duke for several years have conducted a hotel at Davis Creek, where they have prospered. However, about a month ago she sufficiently recovered to be taken to Sacramento where she was placed in a hospital and everything that medical science could prescribe and tender care was given, but to no avail. She suffered constantly, and only last week Mr. Duke wrote home that his wife was in a critical condition, and very little hopes for her final recovery were entertained by attending physicians.

### Camp Elects Officers.

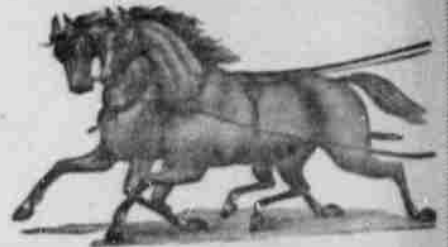
Last Thursday evening Lakeview Encampment No. 18, I. O. O. F., elected the following officers to serve the ensuing term of one year:
