The official abstract of the vote in Oregon was received at this office yesterday from the State Republican Committee. Roosevelt's plurality in the state is 42,726, and his majority 30,675.

The democrats are trying to sympathize with Roosevelt for fear the pie will run short with such a large number of office seekers. Why bless their souls, prosperity is so rampant that Mr. Roosevelt is giving offices to democrats.

Chairman Frank C. Baker, of the State Republican committee, is in the national capital. He was presented to President Roosevelt by Senators Mitchell and Fulton. The president warmly congratulated Mr. Baker upon his management of the recent campaign in Oregon. Mr. Baker will remain in Washington till after the holidays.

Late reports from the Orient state that all the Russian war vessels in the Port Arthur fleet have been destroyed by the Japanese land forces stationed at what is known as 203-Meter Hill, 600 feet above sea level, a position recently gained by the Japanese land forces, for which they paid dearly in numbers, losing about 15,000 men. Russia is said to be preparing to send other fleets from the Baltic into the trap. The Japs will direct their fire upon the fleet as soon as all the war ships are destroyed.

Mrs. Cassie Chadwick, the most talked of woman just now in the country, was arrested in Chicago on the 8th, and placed under \$15,000 bonds, in default of which she had to go to jail. Her indebtedness may reach the enormous sum of \$20,000,000. She has wrecked 2 or 3 banks. A charge of forgery is liable to be placed against her. She secured loans on two notes alleged to have been signed by Andrew Carnegie. Mr. Carnegie denies ever having given Mrs. Chadwick his note.

Another great stock panic was created in the Wall Street stock market on the 8th, when nearly three million shares of various stocks were traded in at losses ranging from \$30,000,000 to \$80,000,000. The shrinkage in values of United States Steel Corporation's stock amounted to about \$80,000,000, while that of Amalgamated Copper reached \$30,000,000. Other stocks lost heavily, among them the St. Paul, Missouri Pacific, New York Central, Union Pacific and Southern Pacific. Thos. W. Lawson created the panic, and it will be read of in the future as "Lawson Panic." Such a panic has not been created in New York since the Northern Pacific Panic in 1901.

It was natural, in the circumstances, and it will happen continually, under our system. In politics the Oregonian opposed Mitchell and Hermann, many a long year, with such power as it could command. But it knows, and cannot but admit, that any man of Oregon, in public place, would have favored applicants and claimants from Oregon—unless they had known the claims were fraudulent—which it was impossible for them to know. Let us see the men of Oregon, in representative place at Washington, who when the application is made, fair on its face, would turn applicants from Oregon down. Such frauds as the jury may find should be punished; but Mitchell and Hermann could not be on the look-out for them; and they had the right to suppose, as they did suppose, that the applications were lawful. This is said by The Oregonian that has opposed Mitchell and Hermann "from way back," and would have terminated the political career of both thirty years ago, if it could. But it opposed them on grave matters; and it always has been aware, as it is now, that there can be no just attack on them or on other representatives of Oregon, on the ground that they have assisted citizens of Oregon, presumably or apparently honest, in matters at Washington. If you have men at Washington who will not do this, you will not keep them there long."—Oregonian.
