RESOLUTION.

Introduced by Harry Bailey.

RESOLVED: That the rate of taxation levied upon the property of the Town of Lakeview, Oregon, for the tax of 1904, for general town purposes be three (3) mills upon each dollar of valuation of such property according to the assessed valuation of said property for the year 1904.

Be it further RESOLVED: That a special tax be levied upon the property of the Town of Lakeview, Oregon, for the purpose of paying the interest on the bonded indebtedness of said town. It is hereby ordered that a special tax of three (3) mills be and is hereby levied upon each dollar of valuation of such property according to the assessed valuation of said property for the year 1904.

It is further ordered that a road poll tax of three dollars be and is hereby levied on all male inhabitants of the Town of Lakeview, Oregon, and subject to such tax by the laws of the State of Oregon.

Moved by Harry Bailey, seconded by D. P. Malloy that the foregoing resolution be adopted.

The roll being called, upon the adoption of the foregoing resolution the following vote was recorded.

The Mayor announced the Resolution carried.

Lands Thrown Open.

About 224,000 acres of the Cascade Mountain lands lying on the West side of the mountain temporarily withdrawn in 1903 for forest purposes, was recently thrown open to settlement, and after 90 days notice can be located. The lands lie in townships 1 to 30 mostly in range 1 East.

Lake county is patiently awaiting a similar action on the temporary reserve in this county. The lands withheld in this county are principally agricultural and none of them sufficiently timbered to be of any value in a forest reserve for any purpose. The department is holding back the development of one of the richest counties in Oregon by keeping these lands tied up in a reserve.
