

**Submarine Illumination at 1905 Fair.**

Portland, Jan. 1st. Elaborate submarine illumination of Gull's Lake will form an unique feature of the Lewis and Clark Centennial. Gull's Lake, which is the largest body of water ever enclosed within an exposition fence, separates the mainland and the Government peninsula, and is spanned by the Bridge of Nations and the Trail, which are aggregatedly over 2,000 feet long. Chief Engineer J. R. Thompson has planned to place rows of fifty candle-power incandescent lamps on the bottom of the Lake on each side of the Bridge of Nations. The lights will be enclosed in air and water tight marine receptacles, and when the illumination is accomplished it will be possible for spectators on the bridge to look down and see fish swimming in the lake.

In order to make the effect as attractive as possible, the lake will be filled with fresh water fish of various kinds, such as lake trout, catfish, bass, mullets and sun fish. Water plants will also be placed on both sides of the bridge.

**Buffalo Meat Expensive.**

Some years ago "Buffalo Bill" bought up all the loose buffalo obtainable and placed them on a large ranch in the Oklahoma country and declared he would raise buffalo for the market. People thought the scheme a "wild goose chase" and believed it was more of an advertisement for his big Wild West show than a proposition for raising buffalo meat. During the holidays in New York the big hotels placed several orders for buffalo meat at the following prices: Loin and ribs \$1.50 per pound, plate and stew \$1.00 per pound. **UNPROFITABLE FEEDING**

Intelligent stock raisers know that a certain amount of feed is necessary to keep an animal alive. They might feed that amount as long as it lives, and it would never gain a pound. There is no profit in that kind of feeding. The kind that pays is the kind that bulks flesh rapidly. If it takes twenty pounds of food each day to keep a sheep alive, twenty-five pounds a day will make it gain flesh. It's the extra five that brings the profit. The first five pounds amounts to nothing, nor does the second or third or fourth five pounds. It's the same way with advertising. You have to do a certain amount to overcome the resistance of the public. You have to do a certain amount of advertising to make them wake up to the fact that you are in business at all. You have to pay a certain amount to keep your advertising alive. What you pay above that amount brings profit. Some advertisers fail because they do not use enough space. They use barely enough or sometimes not quite enough to make the advertising self sustaining. A little bit more would make it profitable. It is better to advertise a little too much than not quite enough.—Charles Austin Bates. Some of our advertisers could enlarge their space with profit.
