County Court Proceedings.

(continued from last week.)

The following bills were examined, approved, and warrants ordered drawn on the General Fund in payment of same.

Includes William Cole, labor; A W Manning, Postage stamps; C O Metzker, County Printing; W R Heryford, rent of hall for election; Frank Calderwood, witness Circuit Court; Ruth Penland, Care of County Poor; Chas Reed, hauling gravel; The White Stamp & Seal Co., County Court Seal; Lee Beall, express and supplies; The Irwin-Hodson Co., supplies; William Wagner, stationery and printing; Harry Riggs, witness fees Circuit Court; Chas Nelson, Jurors fees; E H Smith, examination of insane person; Warrants for salaries of County Officers for November and December, 1904, ordered drawn.

It is hereby ordered that the following be, and they are hereby appointed Road Supervisors for Lake County:

- For Road District No. 1, Silver Lake, Geo. S. Parker; For Road District No. 2, Summer Lake, C. C. Harris; For Road District No. 3, Paisley, T. W. Johnson; For Road District No. 4, Crooked Creek, W. P. Heryford; For Road District No. 5, North Warner, W. K. Barry; For Road District No. 6, South Warner, Andy Morris; For Road District No. 9, Drews Valley, Dan Chandler; For Road District No. 10, Goose Lake, Ed. Tatro;

For Road District No. 11, Cogswell Creek, T. B. Vernon.

There being a contest for the County Printing by the publishers of the newspapers; it is hereby ordered that January 5th, 1905, at 10 o'clock A. M. is the time and day appointed to select such newspaper, and the contestants are requested to deposit with the County Court, under seal, a list of subscribers as is required by law.

JANUARY 5TH.

After a careful examination of the taxable property of Lake County, as shown by the Assessment Roll returned for the year 1904, and of the amount of money required to pay the expenses of said County for the ensuing year, and for the purpose of paying the principal and interest of outstanding County warrants and for such other purposes as is required by law; it is hereby ordered by the County Court that a tax levy be, and it is hereby levied upon all taxable property in Lake County, Oregon, for said year as follows, to-wit:

For County purposes, nine mills (.009);

For County School purposes, five mills (.005);

For County Road purposes, one and one-half mills (.0015).

For interest, and payment of outstanding County warrants, six and three-tenths mills (.0063).

Total for County, School and Road purposes, twenty-one and eight-tenths mills (.0218).

And that the said rate of twenty-one and eight-tenths mills be levied on each dollar of taxable property as shown by the Assessment Roll of 1904, and also upon such property as may be assessed by the sheriff of Lake county, Oregon, in conformity with law.

In the matter of drawing the Jury List for 1905, the Court, having examined the names which appear upon the Assessment Roll for the year 1904 as to the qualified jurors:

It is hereby ordered that the Jury List drawn by this Court be, and it is hereby filed as the Jury List for Lake County, Oregon, for the year 1905.

In the matter of the selection of a newspaper to publish the County Court proceedings for the ensuing year; it appearing to the Court that the Lake County Examiner has the largest list of bona fide subscribers in said County, therefore:

It is hereby ordered, that the Lake County Examiner be, and it is hereby selected as the newspaper to publish the said County Court proceedings for the year 1905 as required by law.

JANUARY 6TH.

In the matter of selecting a County Physician for the ensuing year, bids were filed by Drs. E. H. Smith and T. V. Hall. The bid of Dr. E. H. Smith was \$25 per month and 50 cents per mile; the bid of Dr. T. V. Hall was for 24.50 per month and 50 cents per mile. The bid of Dr. T. V. Hall being the lowest and best, it is hereby ordered that Dr. T. V. Hall be, and he is hereby selected as County Physician for the year 1905.

Ordered that a License to sell spirituous, malt and vinous liquors in less quantities than one gallon is hereby granted to W. P. Moulder, at Plush, Lake county, Oregon, for a period of six months from and after the 8th day of January, 1905, the said W. P. Moulder having complied with all the requirements of law in the premises.

Court now adjourned for the term, all matters pending continued.
