ROOSEVELT'S FIRM STAND.

Thousands of democrats voted for Mr. Roosevelt in the belief that under his direction the government would be honestly, fearlessly, and wisely administered, in a spirit of justice to all the people. These democratic voters believed that associated Capital was extorting from the people more than a fair share of the profits of business transacted in the country. Democratic leaders and democratic platforms had declaimed loudly, for years against such things, but had neglected repeatedly, opportunities to DO something. Mr. Roosevelt had not made such boisterous pretensions of sympathy with the people, but he had quickly done something in behalf of labor that only such a man as the President is would dare to think of doing. He obliged the Combined Coal carrying Railroads and mine owners of Pennsylvania and New York to submit differences between themselves and their employes to arbitration, a thing the magnates had said they would not do. Here was a display of firmness and force, the people had not seen before. It inspired them with a new hope, and they refused to turn away from the man who had quickened it into life. Day by day their confidence grows. Each mail brings confirmation of the people's belief that the honesty and courage of Mr. Roosevelt is of the kind that survives Conventions and political campaigns. This is now emphasized by his declaration that every power of the government shall be brought to bear to establish even justice between the people and the railroads.

Every person whose knowledge and experience could be of any value, is being consulted. The Railroads are being afforded every opportunity to present their side of the case. All possible sources of knowledge are appended to. All the light that can be thrown on the subject is to be brought to bear. Something shall be done says the President. "We want to find the right way to do the right thing. Then we must dare to do it, whoever opposes."

Never was confidence more wisely placed.

One of the stipulations, upon the admittance of Oregon, as a state, was, that upon certain conditions with which the state has complied, Oregon is entitled to receive 5 per centum of the net proceeds of sales of all public lands in the state sold by the government. Large amounts of government lands situated in this state have been exchanged by the government for lands in other states. Upon lands so exchanged the State has received nothing. Governor Chamberlain believes that Oregon has a valid claim against the government for 5 per centum of the value of this land and has begun taking measures to collect it. If successful there will thus be added to Oregon's road fund, more than \$100,000.

At a meeting of educators from various parts of the state, the propriety of diverting county institute funds to the purpose of making the educational Congress to be held at the Lewis and Clark exposition a success, and at the same time, give valuable experience to the teachers of the State, this seems well, but can it be done? The law seems to require teachers county institutes to be held and requires teachers to attend them under penalties for failure. They cannot be held without funds. Again can the funds for this use be turned to another—however, closely related not provided for by law.
