

A Suggestion for What it is Worth.

As a means of settling the prevailing range trouble between the different stock interests in the state of Oregon. Why should not the State of Oregon assume control of all the public land within the state, that is not otherwise disposed of by the general government and pass laws governing the use of the range by the different stock interests of the State? As the State is at the expense of protecting the property of persons using the range to pasture their stock and as the stock industry is of great importance especially East of the Cascade mountains as furnishing more or less of the taxable property in those sections it would be to the interest of the people of the whole State if some means could be devised by which the range war, that has been a curse to counties lying East of the mountains could be brought to an end. To do this the State through the legislature should enact laws assuming control of the range and then in some equitable way apportion the use of the range between the sheep and cattle owners until the land is otherwise disposed of by the United States. The State in this way could put a stop to all range trouble without assuming any greater power than asserting the right to pass laws to prevent the commission of crime, by its citizens and the best way to do this is to remove the cause by stepping in between the disputants and clearly defining the rights of each to the use of what in a legal sense no one has a right to.

This could be done by passing a law that will give a commission composed of an equal number each of sheep and cattle owners, to meet and agree upon boundary lines for the ranging of cattle and sheep and in case they cannot agree, on a boundary line they may call in some disinterested person whose decision shall be final, then to make it a misdemeanor to herd sheep inside the limits set aside as a cattle range. Make the Stock Inspector and his deputies, guardians of the range

provide that each sheepowner may record with the County Clerk a list of land that he is accustomed to herd his sheep on, that after such a list is filed it shall be posted in a conspicuous place for 60 days and advertised for at least 4 weeks in some newspaper published in the county in which the range applied for is situated. If at the expiration of 60 days no objection is made, such list of land shall be recorded and be considered as the range belonging to such applicant as long as used by him. In case of a protest, said contest shall be settled by arbitration or in such other way as may be provided by law.

I only offer the above as a suggestion as to what I believe may be the quickest way to settle the range trouble. Hoping that a solution may be found satisfactory to all. I offer the above for what it is worth.

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
