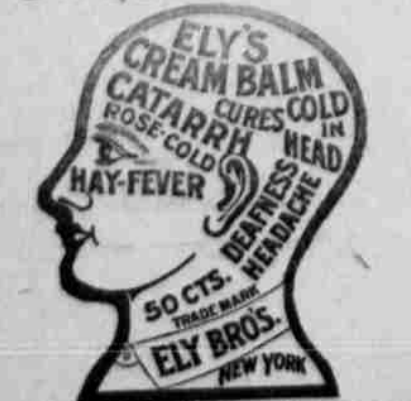

DOG DEFIES FIRE AND WATER

Canine Left to Guard Master's Apartment Sticks to Post Although Flames Rage About Him.

The bulldog's tenacity of grip is proverbial, but he also possesses a grip of quite another sort, one which enables him to stick to his orders in spite of the most untoward circumstances. The Atlanta Constitution gives an example of a dog's faithfulness. "Stub's" master had gone away for the night and had left the dog to guard his apartments.

In the evening the house caught fire, and before the fire engine arrived the blaze had gained firm hold and little could be saved. Some of the men discovered the dog and tried to coax or drive him from the room, but Stub held his post. His would-be rescuers did all they could to lull him out, but it would not budge. Warning growls showed that he would see his teeth if the men resorted to force, and finally, in their efforts to save the dog, the firemen turned two streams of water on him. Even this did not dislodge him.

The dog's master was found and notified of the fire. When he reached his home the roof had fallen in and the building was a mass of flames. He gave one clear whistle, and Stub, who had defied fire and water and all human inducements, bounded out of the house and the next instant was licking the hand which caressed him.

BIG FIELD FOR MAIL THIEF.

United States Post Office Service Affords Wide Scope for Craft of Letter Crooks.

"Yes, there are some pretty nice pickings in the mail service if the

Jerks want to take chances," said one of the postal inspectors to a Philadelphia Record reporter. "Take the case of just one fellow on whom we landed recently. In one year we traced \$475 of missing money to him, and there is no telling how much he got away with that couldn't be accounted for. Of the \$475, he swiped as high as \$50 in cash from one letter, and as low as 60 cents. And these were not registered letters, which shows the foolishness of sending money through the mails without taking proper precautions. In one instance a traveling man sent his wife \$4 in a letter. It never reached her, and her kick brought \$3 more. That was swiped, too, and the circumstances of two thefts in one family, one following the other so closely, was largely instrumental in casting suspicion on the culprit."
