Crimes Committed on the Range.

The remedy for these crimes is the same as for all other offenses—the execution of the law. There is no more reason that new rules shall be established for the use of the range as a means of satisfying the people who commit these outrages, than that something should be done to soothe or satisfy the unreasonable demands of lawless people in other cases.

Society cannot, society will not, undertake to establish such laws as meet the sanction and approval of those who neither respect nor obey law. There is nothing in this matter but the problem of how to compel people to respect the rights of others, and that it knows not to be a problem where the laws we have are enforced.

How do they reasonable law when punishment for their crimes is certain.

Before offenders can be punished they must be discovered. This is the difficulty confronting the authorities. Who are the offenders? Let this be determined and every guilty person in Lake county, if we can get hold of him, will be duly punished. These crimes have been committed in localities not settled; 125 miles from the County seat, and in a country the topography of which is such that nothing is left that can be a clue to who the guilty persons are and no officer can reach the scene of such crimes in less than 5 or 6 days, when the guilty persons are far away, not having left a single clue except such as might appear to the shrewdest detective.

Since the authorities of Lake county the men who may reasonably be presumed to be guilty, and the Examiner guarantees that they shall be brought to trial.

The people of Lake county do not punish their offenses. We cannot however, that, according to the laws of the county would be ready to convict those who would be guilty, and that those who are guilty, as any other person. How to find the guilty persons, is what we ask. No compromise with lawlessness is accepted or offered.

Public lands are common and can be justly used only in common. Any attempt to set apart, by any rule, certain parts of them to particular persons about land to injustice and inequality—of course this is so.

Any man may now use all that he can use. What then do the sheep-killers and their sympathizers want?

To exclude others from a privilege they claim for themselves, which is the right of all. This is too plain to be misunderstood, and Lake county is ready to punish them if they can be found. But here is the difficulty and the only difficulty in the matter, they do want no guarantee to do the things they want, how long we are to wait—the responsibility of those who are. The people who are allowed for the destruction of the land of the county of the State, and to be used for that purpose.

The people of Lake county are so much responsible for these crimes than others, because of the distance of the scene of such offenses, which might be reached almost as easily from Portland as from Lakeview.

There is every reason to believe these offenders are not citizens of Lake county; that not one of them would have been found in the county within 5 hours after the crimes were committed, nor is it known that one

of them has been in the county since, nor that one of them owns property or pays taxes in the county.

How can it then be thought that a statute enabling those who have, or may, suffer loss by such crimes to recover damage from Lake county, act as a check or preventative in the future? Why should innocent people be obliged to suffer for that which they could not prevent, any further than common law requires.

Lake county has not been lax in its efforts to discover and punish these offenders, so far as we had the means of doing so. To oblige us to pay for property destroyed with no probability that a single guilty person would feel the penalty does not promise to be of any benefit, whatever.

Now that Congress is busy making appropriations, not a word comes from any democrat pleading for economy. Every word of caution comes from republicans. Sincerity and consistency, are however, not permanent characteristics of most politicians, and they are not expected to be so vehement in denunciation of extravagance when the money is leaving their way.

News from Portland indicates there is some danger of trouble between Governor Chamberlain and the legislature on account of the emergency clause attached to laws passed. The legislature already has right to determine for themselves, whether an emergency exists. So also may the Governor refuse his signature to any bill for reasons deemed by him sufficient.

The President is not easily turned away from his purposes. He insists on carrying out the programme of naval improvement already planned by the government. He approves the disposition of Congress to economize, but believes the country should practice that virtue in other respects, and let naval construction go on unchecked.

Mr. Bryan announces that the trusts will be the great question in the next Presidential campaign. This we expect to see disproven like other prophecies made by Mr. Bryan as we confidently believe Mr. Roosevelt will have taught the trusts they must obey the law before his term in office expires.

Chief Judge Secretary of the Federal Grand Jury at Portland has been discharged from further service without trial and requested to return to his home and remain there under pain of the displeasure of the United States District Court. Nothing is known of the cause or slight cause of this action.

The United States Senate was organized on the 25th as a court of impeachment for the trial of Judge Charles Swaine of Florida, charged by the House with "high crimes and misdemeanors in office." It is expected that the verdict may not be reached before the last of February.

The most pleasing utterance coming from politicians now a days is the declaration of Democrats in Congress that they are ready to follow the example of the President in his determination to withhold the privilege of patronage of employing of railroad freight rates.

The Mammoth irrigation project will go on to completion as planned, notwithstanding various attempts to check and hinder it. We believe there is nothing in any of the objections offered, but a desire to get money dishonestly.

The report of the State board of health shows the birth rate in Lake county to be the highest of any county in the state according to population, and we are very proud of the distinction.
