GOD PAPER-WAD TARGET.

Japanese Chew Written Prayer Into Ball and Hurl at Face of Idol. —After-Effects.

Along the sacred road of Nikko, in Japan, is an idol about which centers one of the most curious worship in the world. Upon the surface of the statue are seen little pieces of what appear to be dried paper. If you stand by the idol for a while and wait for a worshiper to come along, you will see what these bits of paper are. The devotee halts in front of the image, then scribbles a prayer on a bit of paper. The wad he then chews up into a ball and hurls at the god. If it hits the face and sticks the prayer is sure to be granted and the pious pilgrim goes away happy. If the ball sticks to some portion of the body the prayer is not quite so propitious, and if it falls to the ground there is absolutely no hope.

Sheep for Warm Climates.

The department of agriculture has recently imported five wool-less sheep—four ewes and a ram—for use in the extreme southern states. A heavy crop of wool is a burden in hot, dry districts, resulting in a direct ill effect on the quality of the mutton. These sheep are being experimented with by the bureau of animal industry. They are hardy and are easy keepers. They were brought from the Barbadoes, where they proved profitable. — Country Life in America.

CHICAGO BIGGEST MARKET.

Both in Perishable and Other Fruits Metropolis is Greatest in the World.

The annual fruit crop of the United States has a value of \$132,000,000. The orchard fruits produced each year have a value of \$41,000,000; small fruits, \$25,000,000; grapes, \$14,000,000, and citrus fruits, grown principally in California and Florida, \$8,549,000.

The seven great fruit-growing states in the order of producing are California, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Illinois and Indiana.

Michigan has more peach trees than any other state. Chicago's receipts by water of Michigan fruits last year were very heavy, but this year they are still heavier. The receipts for two specified days from St. Joseph, Mich., alone amounted to 300,000 packages, principally of peaches.

Peaches also come by rail from nearly every peach-producing state of the west and south, and the turnover of apples in South Water street increases from year to year. Illinois leads all the western states in apples, with an annual product of 9,200,000 bushels, Michigan coming next with 8,951,000 bushels, and Indiana third with 8,620,000 bushels.

The apple crop of the country, which in 1900 was 175,397,000 bushels, has increased with the extension of orchards in the west. Both in perishable and other fruits, Chicago is the greatest fruit market in the world.

In the consumption of coal, iron and cotton, the United States has surpassed all the greatest manufacturing countries of Europe combined in the last quarter of a century.— Success.

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
