**State Schools.**

A move has been made in the legislature looking to a thorough investigation of the educational institutions supported by the State and a report and recommendations to be made to the next General Assembly.

It seems likely that this will result in good. The population of Oregon is not large. State schools have not large matriculations; it seems reasonable that a less number of schools might be better provided for, better equipped, and thus certainly enabled to accomplish better results, while accommodating every person desiring to attend.

Concentration is always an element of strength, economy and efficiency.

We should be glad if the vexed question of statehood for certain territories was out of national politics. Inevitable times have been wasted in debates, and in committee sessions in each congress for 20 years. The present congress has struggled with this problem throughout its existence to the present, and now threatens to transmit it to the next. It should be determined now. Indian Territory and Oklahoma would, together make a state to be proud of; but either one of them have already a larger population than several of the states, and both of them desire separate admittance and they are entitled to it. Arizona and New Mexico should be admitted as one State with power to divide whenever they had each attained to specified, reasonable, qualifications. This would end the matter.

There is some canvassing doing in the legislature to ascertain the feelings of members on the subject of adjournment of present session to meet at sometime within one year. There can be no reason for this, that will satisfy the people. If the legislature would give it's time to serious work for the next ten days, nothing of any real importance need be left for them to do. Our legislature does not seem to have made any mistakes so far. We should regard adjournment to a day, as setting a very excellent record. If no great achievements have characterized their meeting, it still is very creditable in that no wrongs have been done.

During the early part of last week, news were rather blue when the first news from the Russian movement in Manchurian blizzards seemed to give promise of success. But our friends, the Japs, were equal to the emergency. The Russians were finally beaten and driven back with nothing but heavy losses as reward for bringing on an engagement in a blinding snow storm with mercury below zero. The two armies are now in the same positions they were before the engagement, with the Russians disheartened, while the Japs are buoyant.

The news from Washington shows that the House has passed the Senate bill providing for removal of obstacles in the way of the Klamath irrigation work, with minor amendments. The Ankeny Company has named a price for its rights that appears reasonable. The Klamath Canal company asks \$500,000 which is regarded as unreasonable.

Nasty things are said about pro-senator Heney, all of which Mr. Heney denies, and the revelations made cause the matter to look very much like a malicious attempt to destroy

the usefulness of an officer who may be trying to do his duty.

In the matter of government regulation of railroad rates, the people are asking only that the railroads shall do equal justice to all. That rebates and secret rates to large shippers, or to the people of one community to the injury of another shall cease, and this will come to pass. Congress will not be required to act hastily. No radical legislation is desired. Equality and justice is all that is demanded, and will be established.

Kuropatkin, in taking the aggressive at a time when it was difficult for men to live under any circumstances, if exposed in the prevailing storm, deliberately acted in disregard of the lives of such as might be wounded in the recent battle, most of whom were frozen to death if they chanced not to be able to drag themselves to safety. This was a deliberate purpose. Such a result must have been foreseen.

One gets bewildered in moving among the figures representing the wealth of the components of the Beef Trust. Yet this alliance of associated wealth has been told by the courts the scaled discriminating rates which they arranged with the railroads, and their agreements for uniform prices and other acts injurious to the people with against public policy, and must cease.

A bill has been introduced in the Nevada legislature prohibiting the sale of liquors along the line of government irrigation works in that state. Robberies, assaults and murders are attributed to the presence of saloons all along the line of the government canal, now being built in that state.

The small boys of the State have been making faces for ten days whenever the name of Senator Maygers was mentioned. "The chump," they said, wishes to destroy the rarest fun of the Columbia boys. Now their faces are all smiles. Senator Farrar did it.

In the United States Senate, Mr. Teller of Colorado has managed to kill Senator Fylin's bill, which provided that the government should acquire title to 30,000 acres of wagon road land, situated in the Malheur River and within the limits of the Malheur irrigation project, constituting one-third of it.

News comes from Salem that plans for loaning state funds to banks are under discussion. The State cannot afford to loan money except as expressly provided by law. Security in the form of real estate is necessary to safety, and it is better to loan to the people than to corporations.

Secretary Taft's letter to Mr. Payne, chairman of the House committee on Ways and Means states that a system of internal revenue is developing in the Philippine Islands which is hoped will, in a few years enable a free-trade policy to be adopted.

The inhabitants of the Philippine Islands ought to appreciate their situation of dependence, for the present. 200 more American teachers are soon to embark for their country. There is not in all history, such an example of unselfish effort of one people for the uplifting of another.

The State of Washington is moving to authorize the expenditure of considerable money for the building of good, permanent roads. The counties are nearly all actively discussing plans and making investments in road machinery.

Does any one remember a time when the President of the United States, whoever he may have been, was so generally approved as Mr. Roosevelt now is?
