By the courtesy of Representative Steiner, we have received copies of House Bill 116, better a bill for an act to pay freight stock coming into the State of Oregon for the purpose of purchasing House Bill 112, a bill for an act to provide for the assessment of property; House Bill 113, a bill for an act to provide for paying loan rate of the range from 400 county to another; House Bill 114, a bill for an act to make counties and municipalities liable for injury and destruction of livestock within their respective limits, the last two having been introduced by Mr. Steiner. All these bills refer to subjects of interest to the people of Lake county, and plainly indicate activity of Representative Steiner in matters affecting those who gave their interests to his care.

Silver Lake Shooting Case.

B. F. Lane who is said to have made an assault upon Bert McKune on the range east of Silver Lake some time ago, came into Lakeview last Sunday in custody of E. N. Kelsay and A. B. Schroder, charged with "assault with a dangerous weapon with intent to kill."

Mr. Lane appeared before Justice of the Peace, W. Bayley on Monday and waived examination, whereupon, Justice Bayley held him to answer at the May term of Lake County Circuit Court fixing his bond at \$5,000. Messrs Brattain and Batchelder Attorneys for Mr. Lane, District Attorney, W. J. Moore acting for the state.

B. F. Lane, as we go to press, remains in custody of the officers, not having given bond for \$5,000.

Investigate all Institutions.

Governor Chamberlain, in explanation of charges made against Superintendent James of the State penitentiary, declares in a message to the legislature that the practices charged have been, and are, followed by all the State institutions, and have been deemed necessary by the governing boards; and that if the legislature shall cause different regulations by which officers and attendants of these institutions shall be deprived of the benefits complained of, it will be necessary to increase the salaries of officers, and also the pay of guards and attendants. It does not seem that the practices complained of have been criminal in intent.
