Nobles Address Czar.

The Nobles of Russia, assembled in St. Petersburg, have presented to the Czar a lengthy address which closes as follows:

Sire, order now that the representatives of the country may raise their voices to the throne and participate, in accordance with your sovereign direction, in legislation and discussion of governmental measures. The nobles of St. Petersburg sincerely believe that, provided union of the throne and nation is supported by confidence on the part of the Emperor, internal troubles will vanish, and that all Russia will rise and serve the sovereign faithfully, for the salvation and glory of the country and the confusion of its enemies.

The address was adopted, 158 to 20.

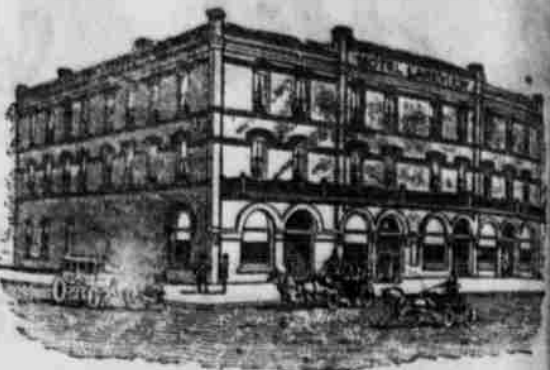
