Justice Waits.

The inaugural address of the Governor of New Jersey contains some announcements not only startling but astounding. After announcing that the ordinary receipts of the state treasury for the fiscal year had been nearly \$5,000,000, the governor congratulated the people upon the fact that, "of the entire income of government, not a penny was paid directly by the people," and that nearly 78 per cent of it "came from railroads and other business companies, domiciled in the State." Here is something for study. We cannot be expected to believe, that corporations "domiciled" in New Jersey, are contributing 78 per cent of the public revenues of that state simply for the privilege of keeping offices there, without some corresponding benefit. They originated in other states, do nearly all their business in other states, and have, in most instances, every vestige of their property in other States except mere office fixtures.

Of course there is something false, unjust and rotten at the bottom of this. These people, deriving their corporate existence from New Jersey, and being "domiciled" there, are beyond the reach of legal process from other states, where their business is all done, most of it in open defiance of the laws of the states in which such business is transacted.

We believe in the final triumph of right, and do not doubt that the day will come when government in New Jersey will be supported as it is in other states, and not by contributions from creatures of its own laws, which thrive by methods of business that would not be tolerated by other communities one moment, were they in the jurisdiction of their courts. These "railroads and other business companies are simply sheltered in New Jersey to escape their real obligations to other communities, while they grow rich by extortion and plunder. The billion dollar steel trust which so ingloriously collapsed years ago is an example of this.

Governors of States, legislatures and many commercial bodies have spoken, from all parts of the country, most heartily approving the policy of the President, in demanding that Congress shall enact a law establishing government supervision of railroad freight rates. Our faith in the correctness of this policy and the certainty of its adoption, increases with every hour that we give to the study of it. It is clear, that the profits of all business, and therefore of all industrial enterprises, depend largely upon the costs of transportation. It is equally well known that the railroads, acting in harmony with the trusts, and in utter disregard of the rights of individual small shippers, have aided greatly to destroy that healthy competition in trade, everywhere admitted to be essential to general prosperity. The government can be trusted to do justice to all classes of its citizens. We shall never believe that equal justice will be done in any other way, because it has not been done.

Readers of The Examiner have noticed many clippings from our exchanges, showing that the people of nearly every county in the state are actively engaged in considering and putting into execution plans for im-

provement and building highways. In every state this movement is in evidence, and that which is the most striking feature of it all is, that those communities known to have done most in this direction already, and to be ahead of others in this respect are most urgent of all in their demands for better and permanently good roads. Do the people of Lake county care nothing for all this?

Kansas is about to offer John D. Rockefeller battle. The Senate of that state, sitting in committee of the whole, has recommended the passage of the bill creating a State Oil Refinery. This is a bit of folly that will not even excite the contempt of the Standard Oil. Kansas cannot sell oil for less than it costs. The great corporation ignores cost. To destroy competition—in which it never fails, it ignores cost. Then to compel the same people to make good, it disregards cost. Kansas is beaten before she fights.

Growth, is the motto of this age. Shall Lake county not catch a little of the spirit? Better education, is the basis of all progress. Shall Lake county be content with such means of advancement as are thrust upon us? The world is growing away from us! A high-school would be a very small step in the way of progress. When shall we start?

There are now about twelve children of Lake county parents, attending schools in other parts of the State. The annual outlay of money on this account, every dollar of which is lost to Lake county, cannot be less than \$150, for each, or a total of \$1,800; a handsome sum; almost sufficient to build and furnish a high-school building, and keep the money at home.

The world refuses to wait on Lake county, in educational progress. California has raised the State School levy from \$7 to \$9 per census child. Are we willing to pay half that much to make a start towards a High School for the better education of our own children?

The Homestead Steel and Wire Company have advanced the price on all their products \$1 per ton. This has been done in consequence of a greatly increased demand, indicating a growing activity in the building trades throughout the country, giving unmistakable evidence of prosperity.
