Strikes Continue.

Dispatches from Russia are confusing, and little clear information can be gained from them, except that internal troubles there are apparently as far from settled as ever.

One dispatch shows that the government has resolved to convene a popular assembly. Another casts doubt upon it. A dispatch will show that Witte enjoys full confidence of the Czar and is in full power and again another dispatch shows that his house has been searched by order of the Czar, for incriminating papers. Strikes continue throughout the empire, especially in Poland, where people seem willing to die without any definite purpose.

In one dispatch the authorities are represented as being anxious to make peace with Japan, and surrender Manchuria, and again it is denied.

It seems almost certain that Russia must soon acknowledge herself beaten in the far East. Japan will be able to strengthen her armies, while Russia's home condition makes it unsafe for her to dispatch troops to the seat of war. This is the opinion of those most capable of analyzing the situation, and of arriving at probably correct conclusions.

The Oregon State Senate has acted wisely in standing firmly by the agreement entered into between the two houses, whereby legislative work should not be done in the last few hours of the session which need weeks in which to dispose of intelligently.

Speaker Pierce did right in his declaration that he would vote no, on every roll call, if the conditions existing in the closing hours of the session two years ago were established now.

Severe Storms in the East.

With rain and sleet falling over nearly every mile of country from Ohio to New Orleans, the usual avenues of wire communication, which have been demoralized since Sunday, today went from bad to worse. Nearly every branch of commercial life felt the interruption. Cloudy weather, with rain, sleet or snow prevails from the Dakotas to the Gulf of Mexico, where, with warm weather, a heavy rain has been falling for 48 hours.

It is estimated that it will be ten days before the wires are restored between Chattanooga and Atlanta. Natchez, Miss., has been shut off from the world since Saturday last; Vicksburg was cut off for two days, and nothing has been heard from Shreveport, La., since yesterday.

The Last Struggle.

Friends of the railroads are now sending out from Washington hints that the Senate may not pass the house freight-rate bill at this session of Congress, but turn the subject over to a commission to be reported upon in the future.

Should this be done, the people will experience a feeling of disappointment such as they have not known since the defeat of Gen. McDowell at Manassas.

There is involved in this legislation a principle very dear to the people. The railroads have openly, continually, and defiantly, disregarded the law.

The fear that there has grown up in the country an alliance of corporate wealth possessing so much power that it would not be possible to force it into obedience to any law it did not approve, has put all the people into one line, in favor of establishing the principle of government control. Their displeasure will be felt if it fails.
