**Railroad Rates.**

That railroad freight rates is a proper subject of government control there can be no question. Only a few weeks since, there was published by the papers in Oregon, new rates on apples, by the S. P. Company, whereby the freight rates from Oregon points to California were made so high that California buyers were obligated to go East, where apples were so cheap they could afford to pay the S. P. Company a much higher rate and yet undersell the Oregon apples. The explanation was that the company by this method, exchanged a short haul for a long one, and by arbitrary action destroyed a near-by market for the products of Oregon orchards.

If the lower rate from Oregon had been such a fair one, it was still. Such abuses of power by the railroads have been so common that it is no surprise that the people have resolved the power of the government shall be invoked for their protection. Of course there are persons who oppose this. Persons who are always the beneficiaries of such unjust discriminations, or who owe allegiance to the railroads which have been instrumental in establishing them in high places. Some of these highly favored people may have seats in Congress.

A vote taken in Congress on this subject could not have been divided as it was without creating the belief that some members received their consciences from railroad influence.

**Parcels Post.**

A request for the expression of Senator Platt of New York from the Senate of the United States, by giving reasons for the request, makes the sentiments of four-fifths of the people.

The people need a parcels post law, and have been denied one, simply because the companies are opposed to it.

Mr. Platt, a man of very great influence, has frankly announced that he will vote in the Senate against the oft-repeated request of the country for such a law, simply because it would injure his business. Certainly a man whose business interests are in conflict with the rights of the public, is not a competent lawmaker.

**For Protection.**

Canada is considering the problem of a tariff duty on American lumber, for protection of home lumbermen in the big markets of Manitoba and the Northwest.

More and more the countries of the world are drifting into the belief that protection is the only means of developing diversified home industries, and that home markets should be preserved for home producers.

**Economy.**

There is to be some hard fighting in Congress over a number of items

in appropriations. The Public Buildings, and Rivers and Harbors Committees are resisting with firmness, every effort to draw money from the treasury for which there is not a pressing, immediate demand.

There yet remains some doubt whether all that has been recommended for the Columbia will finally be allowed.
