Promotion League.

A movement has begun, which gives every reason to believe that a consumation for which The Examiner has most ardently wished and earnestly worked, is now to be accomplished: Lake County is to have a Development League.

Business men of the town have all State, has passed the Senate. signed a request to people throughout the county, to be present at a meeting to be held in Lakeview at an early date, for the purpose of organbring the League, and instituting plans of work for the development of Lake county. The men who have signed this paper are not men who are much addicted to childs-play, and The Examiner now feels that its efforts to show the accessity of such an organization has found fruit.

We print in another column the call which Lakeview business men. almost to a man, have signed, and declare our belief that the date of that meeting will be the beginning of a new era in Lake county business

On the 17th, the legislature adjourned without day. This body has done quite well. Appropriations by it seem large, but we have not seen one dollar granted for a purpose that appeared unworthy. As to what should be the size of any particular grant of money, only those who had opportunity to find what the real necessities are, can judge. Of the total appropriations of two millions, five hundred thousand, or one fourth the whole, was for the Insane Assylum. Of this the state at the last hour. large must approve. This institution should be the best, in every way that money can make it. Many good laws were enacted, and as few bad ones, perhaps, as any previous legislature has let us off with.

LEGISLATIVE NEWS.

Governor Chamberlain in declaring he will veto the million dollar appropaintion bill, explains that the normal schools are only institutions supported by the state's charity and cannot be conducted on warrants drawn upon the State treasury as the necessary institutions may. The Senate thus seeing itself probably defeated finally agreed to strike out the emergency clause of the bill, so that the Governor sees a chance to get a referendum vote by the people on the appropriation for the normal schools, and agrees to approve the

House bill by McLeod providing for uniform eighth-grade examinations for the public schools of the

County and city boards of health are created by S. B-40 which has passed both Houses.

The claim of John Mullan for legal services rendered the State of Oregon twenty years ago, and which has been before every legislative assembly since, has been granted by the committee on appropriations in the house for \$3,105, as complete satisfaction of all his claims against

Senator Fulton has succeeded in having amendments attached to the Indian appropriation bill by which \$589,000 will be distributed to varions Oregon Indian tribes: \$537,000 coming to the Klamath Indians for lands released to the government from their reservation.

A bill creating a commission to prepare and report to the next legislature, a complete tax code for the State, has passed both houses at

The bill to make counties and municipalities liable for 50 per centum of the value of live stock killed, unlawfully, within their jurisdiction was defeated in the state Senate in

The bill providing for the establishment of an oil refinery in Kansas has passed both Houses and will be approved by the Governor.

The bill for placing all the Normal schools under control of one board

Bill to prohibit sale of liquors to females under 21 years of age has passed both Houses.

News comes from Portland that prosecutor F. J. Heney, intends, when he reaches Washington, that the grand jury for the District of Columbia shall convene, for the purpose of investigation of acts of Mr. Hermann in burning papers in the land office at Washington.
