Marseillaise in Russia.

Students of the University of St. Petersburg have suspended University work for the remainder of the year, and the whole educational system of Russia is collapsed, as a protest of Russian youth against their government.

A large body of those going now toward Moscow are in a day's distance from the capital, and the government has done nothing to meet the protest of the condition of the people notwithstanding much personal risk, as dispatches are true.

The declared "King of Russia" is drawing hourly to its inevitable doom." That the death warrant of an execution is signed and the political liberation of Russia is assured.

While this assembly was hotly discussed in the hall for a procession on the street, no attempt was made by the police to interfere with perfect freedom to say whatever the assembly chose to say inside.

That Russian authorities should countenance such utterances is significant that they dare not interfere. The spirit of liberty is in the air.

Our Philippine Policy.

In July, Secretary of War Taft will leave Washington for the Philippines Islands, the object of his visit being to gain a clear knowledge of conditions there, that the government may deal intelligently with questions of government on the Islands.

If we are wise, we shall so direct affairs in those Islands, as to attach the people there to the people and government of the United States. If they are to be permanently retained as American possessions, the inhabitants must be made to know that it is beneficial to them; that they are not hindered, but helped, to progress. If they are to be released from control by this government, our conduct of their affairs must be such as to make them feel that close friendship with us is essential to their safety and progress.

Mr. Taft has already shown himself capable of handling this subject, and no doubt the very best results will follow his visit.

At Forest City, where Pacific University is established, the city council has passed a saloon license ordinance that promises to lead to interesting events. There was, it appears, in the original deed to all city land property, a stipulation against the use of it for the purposes of liquor traffic, and the university faculty says it will fight for title to the land, and house, where a saloon is operated, under the forfeiture clause of the original deed to all city property. It is said the test is sure to be made.

The Public Lands Commission, in recommending to the President a general revision of laws relating to management and disposal of lands of the United States, said in a closing sentence, "the fundamental fact that characterizes the situation under the present land laws, is that the number of patents issued is out of all proportion to the number of new homes."

It should never be forgotten by great corporations, that the people rule in this country, and that it is better to submit, without too much resistance, to the reasonable restraints of law, while the people are yet patient, than to push resistance to control by the people to a point where their patience is exhausted.

In Russia.

Many private employers are advancing the wages of labor in Russia, fifteen to twenty per cent, and are establishing eight, sometimes nine hours, as a day's work. Work will be resumed and continue for a day or two, when the men find they still have grievances, and again quit.

In a place where it was thought confidence had been restored, suddenly all is mud, wild disorder reigns. Then another form of vengeance is deemed safe, they murder Jews.
