Referendum or Initiative.

At a meeting in McMinnville, on Feb. 28th, the citizens put in motion, preparations for submitting the \$1,000,000 appropriation bill passed by the late legislature, to the people for their approval or rejection, under the referendum.

The measure is objected to chiefly because of the appropriation it carries for Normal Schools.

Evidently the state is supporting a greater number of schools of this class than are useful. We took this position while the legislature was in session, and then advocated the discontinuance of one or two of them by act of the legislature.

However, the institutions of the state, while legally existing, are entitled to support. The law should be sustained, for the reason that great harm will be done all the institutions if it is not, and it is to be hoped this movement will fail.

Someone has suggested an initiative action of the people regarding appropriations for the State institutions, rather than by referendum. By this the people could enact such a law as they think best, and repeal the one passed by the legislature.

Let Us Go Forward.

We have no fads. We are not advocating reckless expenditure of public money, nor the needless creation of public indebtedness; but we do believe that private fortunes in Lake county are steadily, perhaps slowly, growing, and that we can afford to undertake some public betterment, without distressing any taxpayer, and greatly to the public good.

Lake county needs a court house. It is common knowledge that the one we now have is insufficient. Not one of its rooms is large enough for the purpose for which it is used, four other rooms are needed every day, and seven others are required if all demands should be met.

That we should begin to get ready for this work, with the determination to push it to completion in due time is what we ask for now.

On an acre of irrigated land you may plant 200 apple trees. At ten years old they cannot fail to produce from 5 boxes of apples each. These apples are worth \$2.50 per box in the cities now. This would give you \$11 per acre or \$2,200 per acre for your land and labor each year. If you get the tenth part of it, you would then have five times as much as you get off an acre of land in ordinary crop now.

It is suggested that Mr. Herman is in trouble on account of the District of Columbia indictment whatever the facts are. If the papers burned were public documents, he is guilty as charged. If they were private letters, they were franked in violation of law.

Mrs. James Stanford, widow of the late Leland Stanford, of California and patron of the Stanford University, is dead in Honolulu. She is believed to have been poisoned by her servants.

Senator Fulton has made a good fight for increase in appropriation for the mouth of the Columbia, but has apparently failed.

Shall we take our place among those communities which wait for events, or shall we decide to be of those which bring events to pass?

The question that will be determined at the court house Saturday evening is, shall Lake County take her place among those progressive communities which work to bring things to pass, or write ourselves among those who wait for something to happen. It is not of so much importance what is attempted, as that some concert of views and action shall be established and something attempted, however small.

Odenville Yates of Portland has invented a bottle which, when filled and emptied once can never be filled again. It is expected his invention will make Mr. Yates very rich, since manufacturers of patent medicines and other goods liable to be counterfeited, will pay him a great royalty for use of his invention.

Scientists are now laboring to find out whether small-pox, intestinal catarrh, inflammation of the lungs and other diseases with which fish are found to be afflicted, are communicated to the human body by eating the fish.

City Attorney McNary has instituted suit in the circuit court of Multnomah county, to have determined whether the elections in the City of Portland to be held in April and June shall be under the direct primary law or not.

A great battle is progressing in Manchuria, with the usual results. Russia is being steadily driven, though resisting with desperation. It now seems that it will require the highest skill for Kuropatkin to secure an orderly retreat.

The President has approved a joint resolution passed by Congress providing for the return of battle flags captured during the civil war. We are the only people on earth who would do this.

The irrigation of arid lands in Lake county would certainly add five thousand new taxpayers to our rolls at once. This would mean more than double our present taxes collected.

Edward O. Wolcott of Colorado, at one time United States Senator, and one of the most brilliant and able men of the period of his political activity, is dead in Italy.

The Washington capital city will continue to be Olympia. The Governor has vetoed the bill to remove the State government to Tacoma, and the bill cannot be passed over his objection.

Ringer Hermann has been indicted by the grand jury of the District of Columbia, charged with destroying public documents. He immediately gave bond in the sum of \$2,500.

Oregon hops are threatened with boycott by British brewers. Carelessness in picking, curing and packing, is the cause, for the hops grown in Oregon have proven their superiority.

Dr. James Withycombe, president of the Oregon Agricultural College at Corvallis, has made formal announcement of his candidacy for governor of Oregon.

Oregon's oldest cherry tree is in Clackamas county, and is 52 years of age. This tree is 8 feet in circumference, and has never failed to bear a good crop.

Irrigation of Lake county arid lands means an expenditure of \$4,000,000 in Lake county, and the creation of a boom with a foundation to sustain it.

It is not believed by conferees on the statehood bill that an agreement can be reached, and we shall likely have this trouble all over again in the new congress.
