gress. If we prove competent and capable in our chosen work. We know that we cannot grow except as the country grows.

We do not believe there can be much increase of production or business of any kind in our county except through irrigation of its arid lands. We believe, in fact, that present forms of production have reached the highest point, and that we shall witness a decline in both production and business if irrigation does not become a reality. The wealth and business of this county is not upon a lasting basis. Range is steadily failing. All know this and all know that the range is the chief, the only source from which we derive money from the markets outside. We must prepare for this to fail in a large degree.

Irrigation, alfalfa, beets and apples must be the future reliance for stability and enlargement of business in Lake County.

### Study Economy.

A distinguished authority on economics, writing on matters relating to prosperity of Canada says: "Give Canada the population she needs and she can compete with the world in any respect."

Exactly what we have been contending for some time was the great need of Lake county.

Population is the highest character of wealth in any country, and the greatest power in the promotion of the growth of a community.

Irrigation will bring population to Lake county and there is nothing else that can. Population means development, and new and diversified forms of production. This new energy in productiveness will bring railroads, sure as day follows the night; and all taken together will create a business activity inspiring for a progressive man to think about.
