

Interpretations of the Law.

In the Circuit Court at Astoria, Judge McBride held that it was not necessary, under the local option law, when petitioning the County Court to order an election to be held for the purpose of voting upon the prohibition of the sale of liquors, it is not necessary for petitioners to describe the territory by notes and bounds, when a single precinct only was concerned. The Court also held that delay on the part of the County Court to issue a prohibition order after prohibition had been carried in a precinct, could not over-rule the will of the people as expressed by an election.


