Unlawful Wire Fences.

A small band of horses that were being driven from the Acty horse range, out east of Warner valley, to Merrill by way of Alturas last week, became frightened and stampeded while going through a lane near Alturas and ran into a wire fence. Four of the animals were badly cut and the parties who had bought them were notified, also the owners of the unlawful wire fence and they met at Alturas to compromise the case. Each of the four parties concerned put up \$150, the valuation placed on the injured horses, and drew straws for pick.

Unlawful wire fences are too common through this stock country. Probably if more people would ask for the damages that is rightfully theirs when their animals get injured on these fences it would have a tendency to cause the owners of such fences to keep them in a lawful condition.
