John Prader and Lloyd Henter were here from Summer Lake Saturday. They returned home loaded down with machinery and other farm supplies. They are both of them progressive farmers.

W. A. Currier started to California with 19 head of fine horses last week. He will return next month.

Wayman Withers is building some substantial fence along the highway of his Summer Lake ranch. In fact there is a healthy appearance all along Summer Lake. Probably in the history of this part of the county, so many extensive improvements have not been contemplated to say nothing of their execution as there is at present. More graft

planted, more land cleared, than there has been for years. Several of the farmers are preparing ground for alfalfa, several are planting large orchards. Every farmer up in this section seems to have appointed himself a committee of one to see that the plans of the development league are carried into effect. It is doubtful if there is a community in Oregon more progressive, more wide-awake to its interest than this. Go ahead gentlemen with the development of the county and the Summer Lake and Chewaucan valleys will soon have the prominence that they richly merit.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Lake County Telegraph and Telephone Company was held in the Woodman Hall on Monday the 3rd inst.

### Favors Irrigation.

Mr. J. L. Morris of the West Side seems to be quite favorably taken up with the proposition to irrigate that part of the valley. In conversation with an Examiner representative last Sunday Mr. Morris stated that a few years ago a proposition was on foot to form a private company to store the surplus waters of Drews Creek, build canals and irrigate the land that could be brought under the ditches. The people of the West Side at that time were very favorable to such a scheme and for a time it seemed an assured fact that the scheme would be carried out. At the time, Mr. Morris told the parties that he had no money to put up, but if they could put water on one-half of his 160 acres of level sagebrush land he would deed to them the other half. He was positive that 80 acres under water would be more productive and consequently more valuable than the entire 160 acres dry. Mr. Morris' ranch is all level or comparatively so, as is nearly all the 119 ranches on that side, and one-half of it is as valuable as the other half. There could be no choice in a division. After a while, however, the scheme died, and nothing has been done since to irrigate the lands in the vicinity of Drews creek.
